A. F. Bentley Elected By Majority of 50 Over Conservatives.

A WARM FIGHT.

ST. JOHN, July 21.—A. F. Bentley, of St. Martin, is the new member for St. John county, in the provincial legislature. J. P. Mosher, the candidate of the Conservative government, is defeated by a majority of fifty. People read in the election of yesterday more than the defeat of Mosher; they saw in it another striking blow at the Conservative administration which has now suffered its third successive defeat since placed in power in March of last year.

It was a closely fought battle—on campaign trails they had never seen such a contest. The government threw into the lists its full fighting force. The premier himself, every one of his lieutenants except Hon. Dr. Landry, stumped the county, and with them a big array of lesser lights sought to talk the people out of their well-established opinions.

Hazen himself led the election day workers in Lunenburg and at all the polls the government party had strong forces at work. There was no lack of money and it was freely spent in a vain endeavor to turn the tide.

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SUCCESS OF AN OLD RAILROADER

Isaac Deboo Which Have Been Successful.

A NEW BRUNSWICKER.

Since the earliest days of the I. C. R. Isaac Deboo, of Sussex, well-known, however, in Moncton and along the North Shore, has been connected with and in the service of the I. C. R. till his superannuation a few months ago.

Mr. Deboo's career as a railway man has not been one of success, rather the active part which he has taken and the success which attended his efforts, are proverbial. In addition to his general and well-earned reputation, he has, within the last twenty years, made some fine inventions all of which he has put into the use of the I. C. R. and these have all proved useful and beneficial to that railway.

The principal invention is "The Diamond Plug," or as it is better known "The Plug," introduced in 1882. It was put to its first real test and proved its efficiency, when it was in Halifax, and that yard was so-bound after a flood and snow storm. A report sent to the late Mr. J. E. Price, then superintendent of the I. C. R., said that it was a decided success and it was spoken of in highly commendable terms. There was an immediate demand for the plug, which ran on till now Mr. Deboo has not two men working on it.

His first invention was the "Guard Rail Blocks" and "Lead Rail Blocks" for sub-stations, which look like the place of a Mr. Stuart's Guard Rail Fastenings—the fastenings having proved unsatisfactory—and have been used since 1888. Another invention was the Double-End Side Plug, used for unloading cars, the only one ever used in the Maritime Provinces, and as far as is known, the only one in Canada. Mr. Deboo was instrumental in introducing the three "throw" signal switch, and in making a change in the station signal, substituting one which is still in use on the railroad. His last invention, "The Buttery," has attracted the attention of many who possess it as a clever piece of ingenuity. The inventor of this claims that the rotary plug, though excellent for cutting, did not accomplish its purpose and get the desired result, till worked with the buttery. Previous to its invention and subsequent use, hand labor was the only means used to gather in the snow—which was too slow a process in connection with a rotary plug. Two other inventions were the Wing Plug and the Ballast Plug.

Mr. Deboo has been in this country since 1854, and although born in Essex, New Brunswick, he has been connected with the railway in its construction or service since 1854.

Full Text as Delivered in English by J. Hall Kelly, M. L. A.
