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DALHOUSIE SAW MILL IS BURNED

Plant of Sydney Lumber Co. Recently Erected Destroyed on Friday Last.

Dalhousie, N. B., July 25.—The saw mill, built recently by the Sydney Lumber Company to replace the one destroyed by fire about a year ago, is a complete mass of ruins, the result of a fire which broke out a few minutes before 6 o'clock this evening.

In the face of the strong westerly breeze blowing at the time, things looked serious for the town, but the fire brigade, with a good pressure of water, fought successfully.

The origin of the fire is unknown. There is some insurance. About sixty men were employed. F. McVoy, the manager, who arrived here from Campbellton after the conflagration, is hopeful that within a week work will be started to erect a new and larger mill.

MORE EVIDENCE OF BUGS DEATH

Disappearance of Potato Bug Thought to be Work of Parasite

St. John, July 26.—The farmers and potato growers here with delight the gradual disappearance of the potato bug. A few days ago a study of potato area in Nerepis was made and in the six acres under cultivation the bug was found but on two plants. Reports similar to this come from all districts.

Another proof of considerable worth that may be adduced in support of the fact that the day of the potato bug is fast drawing to a decrease in the demand on paris green this season in comparison to the enormous quantity sold last year. Merchants, although pleased to think of the coming extinction of this destructive pest, said yesterday they would lose considerable by the falling off in the call for paris green which is used almost exclusively for this purpose.

As to the cause of this remarkable disappearance the most credible reason offered in the interconnection of a parasite, probably in fungus form. Great interest is evinced in the announcement, and local authorities on entomology stated yesterday that the matter would be taken up and given thorough study.

SHOOTING ACCIDENT AT CACOUNA

Cacouna, July 28.—A serious accident which may have fatal results happened here Friday night. Four young men were hunting in the fields, three of them sitting and resting near the bushes, when one, young Scullion, seeing a squirrel started hunting after it. Unhappily not thinking his companies being so near he took aim and fired the gun. The bullet struck George Dumont, aged 18 years in the back, the ball lodging 3 inches below the heart. Had it passed higher, it would have killed him instantly.

Drs. Dufresne and Couillard were called immediately on the scene and probed for the bullet. Everything possible is being done and hopes of recovery are entertained.

ALL CANADA SHOW AT NEW YORK 1914

Exposition to be World-wide in Character and Occupy Large Area.

Toronto, Ont., July 25.—The Globe says:

Preparations are rapidly assuming concrete form for the All-Canada Exposition, which is to be held in New York at the Grand Central Palace beginning January 15, 1914.

The floor space which the exposition will occupy is 21,000 square feet. The exposition will be Dominion-wide in character and the chief feature will be the exhibit which is at present in Ghent, Belgium, and which has been declared by competent judges to be the finest ever seen in any exposition.

From all parts of the Dominion, collected by provinces, municipalities, towns, and private corporations, will be gathered exhibits, charts, books, pamphlets and pictures which will serve to show the immense resources of the Dominion agriculturally and geologically.

A banquet will be held in New York at the time of the exposition, and it is expected that the Governor General of Canada and the President of the United States, together with diplomatic corps and ambassadors of different countries, will be present.
