RESOURCES ARE NOW NEGLECTED

Wharves Damaged Are Un-
repaired, Railway and Steam-
boat Services Poor.

Increasing food production is now generally acknowledged to be one of the great panaceas to the present high cost of living.

If this is true how does it happen that the Gaspe coast, offering one of the greatest fishing sections of Canada, is in dire distress. The government wharves are in a dilapidated state, fishing inlets and harbors are filled with sand, wharves carried away by a storm four or five years ago are still unrepaired, rail and ship transportation facilities are inefficient. Little or no help is being offered to the poor fishermen of the district to increase their production. American fishing firms are gradually monopolizing the industry and carrying the fish to American ports where it is manufactured into boneless cod and many other attractive foodstuffs for the American and foreign markets.

If the Government made any effort to lend encouragement to this business it would have been controlled by Canadians for the benefit of Canadians and exported in its raw state to the United States thereby helping to raise the value of our Canadian dollar in Uncle Sam's domain.—Quebec Telegraph.
