BAD SPILL ON THE INTERNATIONAL BRANCH

Spreading Rails Ditched I. C. R. Train Last Thursday and Tied Things up

A bad spill occurred about 2:30 last Thursday afternoon on the international branch of the I. C. R. at a point thirty-two miles west of Campbellton, where the four cars of the regular train jumped the track and piled up in the ditch. The damage to rolling stock and roadbed was considerable, but no one was injured in the run-off, which is said to have been due to spreading rails.

A military party from Campbellton accompanied an I.C.R. wrecker to the scene of the run-off, and the work of clearing the wreck went forward Friday. Passengers, baggage and available freight were transferred around the break and came into Campbellton without a very long delay.—Transcript.

In conclusion with the above report we are informed from the officers of the I. C. R., that some one must have had a pipe dream. The facts are these—Four cars of the regular train ran off the track and were replaced by the train crew, the total delay being 2½ hours.

TIMOTHY SEED SITUATION

Present and prospective high prices for hay is having the natural effect in reducing the areas that may be left to timothy seed. Reports from the United States also indicate reduced areas left to this seed crop. Two-thirds of our supply is usually imported from the United States, where it is grown on land ranging in value from \$75 to \$150 per acre. This seed comes rather badly hulled but it particularly free from weed seeds.

The prospects for this year are considerably higher prices for timothy seed. Canadian farmers are advised to bear this situation in mind and arrange to leave for seed particularly clean pieces of timothy.

TAKING A RISK
Bad germination in seed corn combined with prolonged cold weather at time of planting has been the cause of much disappointment this season to ensilage growers. The seed corn growers of south-western Ontario were almost equally disappointed through being unable to find a market for their thoroughly-dried corn of strong vitality. Many samples were taken by seed inspectors and the investigations made indicate clearly that at least 75 per cent of the cause for a poor yield can be traced to the ensilage growers buying low priced seed.

Unfortunately high priced seed is not always a guarantee of high quality, but low priced seed is possible only with corn that has no special care in sowing for seed. The farmer who gets \$1.50 per bus. of 70 lbs. on the ear for corn taken out of his corn crib in the spring has more profit than the farmer who receives \$2.50 a bus. of 70 lbs. on the ear for corn that has been kiln-dried or made-dried in special corn-drying buildings.

If harvested in dry weather and kept in narrow cribs through the winter, the dampness may give a fairly satisfactory stand of plants with thick seeding and good soil and weather conditions. But too many farmers have learned to their sorrow the very serious risk they

STEADY INCREASE

IN COST OF LIVING

Costs Thirty Cents More Per

Week This Year for Average Family to Live

Ottawa, July 26.—It costs the average workingman, who is the head of an average family of five, \$1.31 more per week to live now than it did in 1911, and at least thirty cents per week more than it did a year ago. In part this is his contribution to the taxation of the war. In part it is due also to the steady increase in the cost of living, which has been in progress for the past few years.

The Labor Department's statistical report as to the cost of living gives the index number for June as 147.3, compared with 147.6 for the preceding month, and 135.2 for the corresponding month of last year. Although there have been some decreases in the price of foodstuffs during the past few months, this is counterbalanced by increases in the price of metals and other commodities, which keep the cost of living up to the record figures which have prevailed since the beginning of the year.

The annual report of the Department of Labor, dealing with wholesale prices in Canada for the year 1914, as just issued, gives some interesting statistics as to the cost of living and the effect of the war on prices.

One of the most interesting tables is that giving a typical week's expenditure of a workingman's family on staple foods, fuel, lighting and rental. The compilation is based on proportionate expenditures on an income of \$800 per year. For food the average weekly budget demanded last year \$7.73, as compared with \$7.98 the year before, and \$7.13 in 1911. For fuel and lighting the weekly cost last year was \$1.90, or about one cent less per week than for 1913. Rents show a slight lowering tendency, but this is confined largely to a few specific localities. The average for the Dominion last year was placed at \$4.65 per week, as compared with \$4.75 per week in 1913, and \$4.05 per week in 1911. Since moving day on May 1, when leases in most cities are renewed, the tendency to reduce rents has been more marked.

The figure given for the total weekly budget of necessary expenses for food, rent, light and heat is placed at \$14.31 last year, as compared with \$14.02 for 1913, and \$13 for 1911. Allowing the average cost of living for necessities given for last year, the workingman with a salary of \$800 per year, and a family of five to keep, would have just about \$50 left for the year's clothing, doctor's bills, amusements, church and tobacco.

Commenting on the general trend of prices for the year, the report says there were increases of 14 per cent in grains and feedstuffs, 6 per cent in animals and meats, 8 per cent in woolens, 10 per cent in hides and 7 per cent in drugs and chemicals. There were decreases of 33 per cent in furs and 5 per cent in cottons. Sugar rose from the lowest level on record to the highest since 1890. Interruptions of shipping, with higher freight rates and insurance on the seas, caused steep advances in many commodities, especially in tea and in drugs and chemicals. Increased revenue taxes, in the shape of additional customs and excise duties, caused other increases, notably in sugar, tobacco and liquors.

The consumption of fish in Canada is reported by the dealers to be the largest yet, and this food bids fair to come into fashion as a cheaper substitute for meats.

Take in using corn wintered in this way. It is always advisable for growers to procure seed corn on the ear as during moist weather shelled corn in transportation or storage will absorb moisture and mold within a very few days, thus destroying its vitality.
