It had been fixed up especially for the occasion, and when it is said the weather was extremely cold and that the windows were more or less broken, giving free access to the balmy breeze of Lake Simcoe, the discomfort which the speakers and audience suffered can easily be imagined. Notwithstanding the low temperature and the most depressing influences, the Ministers received an enthusiastic welcome, and their speeches were listened to with the greatest attention.

The afternoon meeting was chiefly attended by the farmers of the county, who, although the weather was almost impassable by snow drifts, turned out in large numbers. In the evening the Ministers addressed an audience of townspeople. James Quinn, president of the Ontario Liberal Conservative Association, occupied the chair on both occasions, and Mr. Haggart was the first to speak.

Hon. J. C. Patterson was the first speaker at the afternoon meeting, and he addressed himself for his hour more particularly to the farmers.
