Toronto Markets.

Toronto, Oct. 17.—Trade was slow and dull to-day, with prices even slower than on Monday. There was a good supply of cattle and they kept coming late. The majority of the shipments, however, were of inferior stock and the butcher buyers, who make the city market, held off, waiting for better stuff to come along. The common cattle, therefore, were a very poor sale and a great many were carried over. A few choice butcher heifers sold at \$5.65 to \$5.75, but the bulk of the butcher cattle ranged from \$4.80 to \$5.40. Cows and bulls were weak at \$3 to \$4.75. Stockers and feeders were steady. Sheep and lambs continued steady at Monday's decline to \$3 to \$4 for ewes and \$2.50 for bucks. Lambs were steady, \$5 to \$5.25. Hogs were still unchanged at \$5.90, f.o.b. Calves were steady at \$4 to \$7. The run included 91 loads, 1,500 cattle, 1,550 sheep and lambs, 500 hogs and 170 calves.
