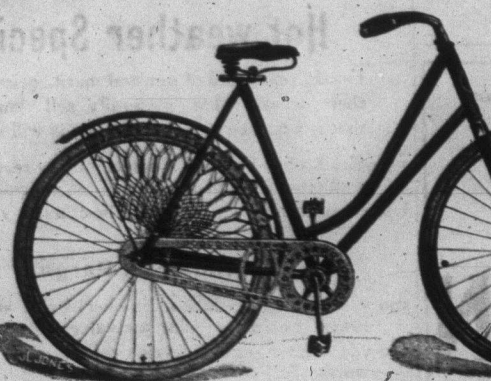

**The Fall of a Woman.**  
Granby, Que., July 5.—What is thought to be an attempted murder and suicide took place at West Granby about 10 o'clock yesterday. The victim was Joseph Bello, 28 years old, and Annie Bello, aged 25. It is supposed the woman first shot Bello and then attempted to take her own life. At 2 o'clock it was said by a physician who had seen both the injured persons that neither probably would live through the day. The cause of the shooting is thought to have been jealousy.

### CROOKED WORKSHOWN UP.

Greenway Government's Campaign Literature was Charged Up to the Deaf and Dumb Asylum.

Winnipeg, July 5.—The report of the Public Accounts Committee has been presented to the Legislature. It shows that it has been the practice of the Government to print campaign literature and charge it to the cost of running the Deaf and Dumb Asylum. It has been the custom to pay large sums for champagne glasses and other similar ware for Government House, and for fear of the temperance vote, to charge the expenditure under the heading "Light and Fuel."

One of the other matters brought to light by the Public Accounts Committee is the manner in which the late Provincial Treasurer, Mr. Greenway, was charged with the cost of the campaign literature at the Deaf and Dumb Asylum.

Mr. Greenway is now in the hospital. He is said to be in a very serious condition.

Mr. J. R. Stratton arrived from the east yesterday. Speaking politically, he said that the Row Government is stronger in Ontario today than ever they were. They carried the last seat by acclamation, and the people are perfectly satisfied with them. As to the Laurier Government, he said that when the next Dominion election comes off, they will make a much better showing in Ontario than they did in the '96 election. Mr. Stratton will proceed west to-day.

London, June 30.—In the House of Lords today during the second reading of the Australian Commonwealth Bill, the Earl of Carrington (Liberal) attacked the alleged attempt of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, to make political capital out of the bill.

**Mr. Henry Wilson of the Victoria.**  
Victoria, B. C., June 30.—Sir Henry Wilson, the new Lieutenant-Governor, was received yesterday by the provincial, civic, naval and military authorities. The B. C. R. with band, turned out, and thousands of citizens lined the route of march.

**THIRTY-FIVE WERE KILLED**  
And Nine More Are Expected to Die From a Trolley Accident.

**The Victims Were Examined.**  
We were celebrating the Fourth of July in the heart of the city yesterday. Thirty-five were killed and nine more are expected to die from a trolley accident.

**Seven Children Killed.**  
Philadelphia, July 5.—Seven children were killed by an explosion of fireworks in Philadelphia.

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**At 7:30 o'clock a yard engine was passing down with a train, running at a good rate of speed towards the lower end of the yard. On passing the engine struck a train of gasoline tanks. Several officials of the yard happened to be here, and as is usual in an accident of the kind, they tried a cannon shot at the engine. The engine, in order to let the fuel out, was stopped.**

**Instantly after the shot had hit the tank, it exploded. The dead and injured were carried to the hospital. At the hospital it was thought that several more deaths would result.**

**New York, July 5.—John Lawler, 50 years old, and his wife, lost their lives in an early morning fire in Brooklyn yesterday. They were suffocated by smoke. Several other persons were overcome, but were revived by the fire department.**

**Three men of the Victoria.**  
Scranton, Pa., July 5.—Three men were killed and one man had a leg broken by a wreck on the Delaware and Lackawanna and Western Railroad at Scranton's Cut, near Henryville, Pa. yesterday. The accident is believed to have been due to a broken axle on an eastbound freight, which threw two cars near the centre of the train from the track.

**Was Former Mayor Dead?**  
London, July 4.—Reporting the death of a man in which the British press, a special despatch from Shanghai adds that reports are current that Vice-Admiral Seymour has been wounded.

**Save the Legation First.**  
London, July 4.—The Parliament of the United Kingdom, the House of Commons, yesterday, said he was able to add but little to the previous information about China.

**British Consul at Tien Tsin, dated June 28, saying the allied forces had burned down arsenals with arms, as well as quantities of stores, powder and ammunition. In conclusion, Mr. Broderick informed the House that the Government could not discuss the future Government of China, its sole pre-occupation at present being to save the legation.**

**THE MORRIS FILE.**  
One Hundred and Two Bodies Recovered—All Dead.

**New York, July 4.—One hundred and two bodies had been recovered from the waters of the North River up to 10 o'clock last night, this being the list of fatalities positively known. The list is growing hour by hour, and today when the tide is in its lowest, it is expected that a great many more bodies will be recovered.**

**All day long yesterday the work of searching the ruins was kept up, incessantly. The officials of the North River Tug Line were doing everything they could to straighten out matters. They looked after the transportation of the bodies of the survivors who were inclined to go. They also gave them clothing and food.**

**A sensation was created yesterday by an announcement from Mayor Pagan of Hoboken that he would prosecute all big boys carrying signs whom charges of refusing to save life could be substantiated. The Mayor said he would apply at once for warrants charging two tug boat captains with murder, and that he had evidence to prove that these men used boat hooks to keep drowning men from climbing on their tug because the unfortunates had no money. An effort would be made also to have the names of the offending captains revoked.**
