

from which the flood comes. In the road of Annamooka, it sets west south-west, and the ebb the contrary; but it falls into the harbour of Tongataboo from the north-west, passes through the two narrow channels, on each side of Hoolaiva, where it runs with considerable rapidity, and then spends itself in the *lagoon*. The ebb returns the same way, and runs with rather greater force. The north-west tide is met at the entrance of the *lagoon*, by one from the east; but this, as I have before observed, was found to be very inconsiderable.
