ment was taking with respect to the transfer of excess profits by the multinational oil companies outside the country. At the time he assured me that the department would have that matter very much in mind.

This past week we have had reports that two of the multinational oil companies have transferred multimillions of dollars out of this country at the same time as raising oil prices. I wonder whether the minister could advise this House what steps he is taking to prevent this intolerable situation.

Hon. Walter Baker (President of Privy Council and Minister of National Revenue): Mr. Speaker, as the hon. gentleman knows, it is improper to discuss on the floor of the House of Commons specific matters in relation to income tax and the Income Tax Act. I am sure the hon. member understands that. I wish to reassure him that the Department of National Revenue is taking its responsibilities under the appropriate statutes with respect to the specific matters he has raised.

TAXING INCREASE IN REVENUES OF OIL MULTINATIONALS

Mr. Ed Lumley (Stormont-Dundas): Mr. Speaker, my supplementary question is for the Prime Minister. Since it was the Prime Minister who first raised this subject in the House when he said he was going to discuss an excess profits tax with the multinational oil companies, I ask the Prime Minister this: is he going to pursue this aspect of taxing the increase in revenues rather than the increase in profits as a result of the oil price increases which we expect to experience in the next few weeks?

Right Hon. Joe Clark (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, we are now actively discussing the mechanism that will be used to ensure that virtually 100 per cent of the revenues that would go to the companies as a result of increases in energy prices will, in fact, be regained by the Government of Canada for the specific application by the Government of Canada for national energy purposes.

OIL SUPPLIES FOR MARITIMES THIS WINTER
