MULTICULTURALISM

GOVERNMENT PRIORITY

Mr. Bob Pennock (Etobicoke North): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of State for Multiculturalism. DEATH OF PASSENGER ON FLIGHT TO TORONTO

Mr. Les Benjamin (Regina West): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of Transport. As he knows, flight attendants are responsible to be aware of and continue to pay attention to the well-being of passengers abroad the aircraft. Is the Minister aware that on an Air Canada flight which arrived in Toronto nine days ago, a passenger who was taken on board in a wheel chair as a debilatated passenger, passed away during the flight, and the attendants did not notice and were not aware of the passenger's death until it was time to take him off the aircraft in a wheel chair?

Hon. Don Mazankowski (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, I have not been made aware of the subject to which the Hon. Member refers. As he knows, there were some 72 alleged infractions which were submitted by the CALFAA organization. Most of those have been investigated. There are
