

teenth day of March to the fifteenth day of July in every year, or take the same in snares, or destroy their eggs, or sell or purchase the same during the time aforesaid, on pain of forty shillings.

XVII. That all hay and straw, which shall be sold in the town or suburbs of Quebec, after the publication hereof, shall be bundled, and every bundle of hay shall weigh fifteen pounds, and every bundle of straw twelve pounds, French weight, on pain of forty shillings.

XVIII. That the butchers, bakers and tavern-keepers have their weights and measures stamped by the clerk of the market, in four days after the publication hereof; and any of the said butchers, bakers or tavern-keepers, selling any meat, or other commodities by weights or measures not stamped, shall forfeit ten shillings for every effence.

XIX. That no person or persons be permitted to beg in the town of Quebec, without first having obtained a licence or permit for that purpose, from the Minister or Curate of the parish and a Commissioner of the Peace, on pain of imprisonment.

XX. All proprietors of houses, hangards, or emplacements, situated in a street, shall, on or before the first day of August next, make a foot-path of four feet wide, along the front of his property so situated; the path shall be level and covered eight inches thick with gravel, the gravel shall be kept compact by a border of timber of at least ten inches square, and so secured as that the wheels of carriages may not move the wood, or the path may be edged with a flag-stone well sunk into the earth; or the proprietors, if they chuse may pave the foot-path. No person's part of the path shall be higher than his neighbours part. The border whether of wood or of stone shall be neatly and well joined in all parts.
