Some Questions the Railway Commission Must Deal With at an Early Hour

Ottawa, Jan. 18.—(Special.)—The government have announced that they will proclaim the Railway Commission Act in force on Feb. 1. The commission have been named as Hon. A. G. Blair, chairman, Prof. Mills and Hon. M. E. Bernier.

As to its Staff. One of the first things the commission will take up will be the appointment of its staff. It will have to decide what form the railways are to provide for transportation of members of parliament. Hitherto they have been by courtesy and all the railroads issued passes to members marked "committee."
