Three Thousand New Houses Will Be Put Up This Season-Lots of Unskilled Labor on Hand.

Winnipeg, April 24.-(Staff Corre spondence.)-In spite of the throng pouring into Winnipeg, some builders assert that they find it necessary to draw on Toronto and Ottawa for some lines of skilled labor. There is a glut on the manual labor market to-day, but is is confidently declared to be due to the late spring. One leading contractor told The World that he had just arranged to secure fifteen bricklayers in Toronto and as many more at Ottawa. He added that two weeks of warm weather would reverse the situation, and open more work than the

abor market could supply. Bricklayers earn fifty-five cents an hour here. In some instances plans are completed for work to be rushed day and night, and skilled men may work as many hours as they please. It is said that carpenters have been invited to seek work here from Toronto. A number of reliable builders have told. The World that there is not employment just now for those carpenters in the city, but that it is but a question of a few days of hot sunshine to make them all busy. The scale is thirty-five cents an hour, and the rush is expected to be so heavy that any man who can drive a nail or guide a handsaw will draw regular journeymen's wages.
