Notwithstanding the more conservative views of the spring wheat situation, published by the milling papers and other authorities yesterday, Snow, Jones and others to-day published statements of extreme damage and an amost total failure of the crop. There was some liquidation early in the way of profit-taking, but it became apparent that it was a market without a top limit under the circumstances, and the early sellers reinstated their holdings and offerings dried up. It has been a very nervous market, declining and ralying one and two cents all within a minute, but on every decline the next rally brought still higher prices, and the closing prices showed between 3c and 4c advance for the day. Our reports from Manitoba are from reliable source, and inclicate a serious outlook. While a great many people have withdrawn from the wheat trade as presenting too much risk, on account of the wide fluctuations, the buying power is more than sufficient to advance prices. An advancing tendency will prevail until the claims of practical destruction of spring wheat are disproved by the threshing returns, in case they are untrue.


