Chicago Cattle.

Wheat—There were two strong reasons for the enormous advance to-day. One was the presence of rain in the harvesting section of the northwest, and the other was the excessive bullish reports sent in by Snow from Minnesota. Strong bullish reports of rain in Manitoba and northwest were strongly contradictory, but had one effect. Modern Miller was bullish, declaring that farmers are holding their best wheat and preparing for winter wheat planting. This might seem a sensational report, one of which stated that the developments of the past few days have been very serious to crop, and wheat trade of northwest is consequently in a semi-panic. Reports of receipts were 700,000, against 780,000 last year. Shipments were double. Trade reports were made up of this kind of total crop will be the smallest for five years, and amount to high-grade wheat. The wheat market was enormous business was transacted in the pit. At the top values, the wheat market was with selling at 11 1/4c. Considering the excitement, prices held well, and a tremendous stream of real orders was without. Corn—While wheat boomed several cents, corn sagged 1/2c or so on the heavy rains that fell where needed badly in corn belt. Another factor was large list of acceptance in country. The market was very active, and selling was indulged. Cables were dull and primary receipts little less than last year. The shipments were not significant. There is some surprise evoked that speculative sales will be very light. There was some liquidation early in the way of profit-taking, but it became apparent that it was a market without a top limit under the circumstances, and the early sellers reinstated their holdings and offerings steady. It has been a very nervous market, declining and rallying, but on every decline the next rally brought still higher prices, and the closing prices showed between 3c and 4c advance for the day. Our reports from Manitoba are from reliable sources, and indicate a serious outlook. While a great many people have withdrawn from the wheat trade as presenting too much risk on account of the wide fluctuations, the buying power of the market is sufficient to advance prices. An advancing tendency will prevail until the evidence of destruction of spring wheat is disproved by the threshing returns, in case they are untrue.

Corn—Country acceptances on bids last night were small. Two houses bought 500,000 bushels and sold against these purchases in today's market. General rains over the belt caused early weakness, but the market became firmer as wheat advanced. The character of the buying was very good, but liquidation of long corn was heavy. Temperatures are rather too high, and as the first of September approaches, greater attention is being given to the danger from early frost than to the advance in prices. A good investment.

Outs—Receipts were larger, and the shipment demand only moderate. Market was stronger in sympathy with wheat, but only showed fractional gains and was rather neglected.

Provisions—Prices were firm, with local traders favoring the long side.
