The Pacific Cable

Course of the Imperial Govern- ment Gives Satisfaction.

Affairs in the Transvaal Ap- proaching a Crisis.

Disfranchised British Subjects Seek the Aid of Canadians.

London, April 28.—Great satisfaction is expressed at the announcement in the Times today of the decision of the Imperial government to contribute a yearly subsidy to the Pacific cable. The amount is not announced, but it is understood to be equal to Canada's grant, five-eighths. The influence of the Pender monopolists and the dread of permanent officialdom to depart from precedent have induced the government to pay a subsidy instead of following the example of Canada and Australia, and joining in a state guar- antee. All will share in the probable profits, as well as the right of nomi- nating commissioners in case the line pays and the subsidy is no longer re- quired.

A CALL FOR HELP.

Canada is being urgently appealed to to assist the disfranchised British sub- jects to secure citizen rights in the Transvaal, where affairs are again reaching a grave crisis. The South African League, of which Cecil Rhodes is the president, representing the best interests in South Africa, has dispatched a cablegram to the British Empire League of Canada, indicating that the hands of the Imperial govern- ment would be greatly strengthened if Canada made known at this critical juncture her sympathy with the Brit- ish subjects.

CANADIAN TRADE

By the launch of the steamer Man- chester Port from the Yarrow shipyard, the Canadian trade secures the largest ship that has yet navigated the Man- chester Canal. The same company is adding several other steamers of the same type, and the Manchester-Can- adian service, believing that the biggest and fastest ships have the best chance of success.

THE DUTY ON COLONIAL WINES.

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, chancellor of the exchequer, received the colonial agents-general and heard their views respecting the new wine duties. The chancellor received the representations of the agents in the most sympathetic manner, and the impression now ex- ists that colonial wines will ultimately be exempted from the payment of the new duties. This is regarded as a hint to France to treat Great Britain fairly in Madagascar.

Madrid, April 28.—The minister of war has received advices to the effect that Aguinaldo intends to "retain the Spanish and American prisoners, as in the event of a cessation of hostilities, it will enable him to demand better terms of peace."

MAY UPSET THE CABINET.

Rome, April 28.—In the Chamber of Deputies yesterday, the minister of marine stated that he had ordered a cruiser built in England, whereupon the chamber voted that the minister should suspend his order. The vote of the chamber may result in the min- istry's downfall.

THE INCREASED COST OF COPPER

London, April 28.—The enormous rise in the price of copper is playing havoc with the leading industries in the Midlands. At Kynoch's, Birmingham, the batches of hundreds of men have been discharged since the rise in the price of the metal began, and now, instead of 4,000 men, only 2,000 are at work there. The government has decided not to give any more orders for car- tridge shells, while the present prices prevail, and orders have been issued to stop all the work possible. The electrical fitting firms are also losing business for the same reason.

THE FIGHTING IN SAMOA.

Auckland, N. Z., April 28.—Particu- lars of the advice received here, from Apia, under the date of April 18, show that the battle between the friendly natives and the rebels took place at Vailate, and that the latter lost one hundred men in killed and wounded.

About two thousand women and children have sought refuge at the Maluit station of the London Mission- ary Society. The rebels are seizing the traders' rifles, cartridges and stores, and the traders are fleeing to Apia. Business is at a standstill, and a strong land force is urgently needed.

The offer of New Zealand to send troops to Samoa caused enthusiasm at Apia. The inhabitants are also unani- mous in the belief that that treaty is a failure, and there is a strong feel- ing in favor of annexation. Prominent American citizens and British sub- jects say German annexation is pre- ferable to the triple control, and that unless Mataafa is subdued another war is inevitable within a year. FILIPINOS

WANT PEACE

Bearers of a Flag of Truce Enter Gen. MacArthur's Lines

En Route to Manila to Confer With the U. S. Commander.

Manila, April 28, 4:25 p.m.—The Fili- pinos will seek peace. Col. Manuel Argueles and Lieut. Jos. Bernal, chief of Gen. Luna's staff, entered Gen. Mac- Arthur's line bearing a flag of truce.

They are en route for Manila by train to confer with Gen. Otis regard- ing terms of surrender.

CONFERENCE FAILED.

Manila, April 28—6:25 p.m.—The Fili- pinos advances for peace were fruitless. Col. Manuel Argueles and Lieut. Jos. Bernal, who came into Gen. MacAr- thur's lines under a flag of truce, told Gen. Otis that they were representa- tives of Gen. Luna, who had been re- quested by Aguinaldo to negotiate for a cessation of hostilities in order to allow time for the summoning of the Filipino congress, which body would decide whether the people wanted peace.

Gen. Otis replied that he did not re- cognize the existence of a Filipino government.

There will be another conference to- morrow.

NEWS FROM OTIS.

Washington, D. C., April 28.—General Otis telegraphs the war department this morning that the commanding general of the insurgents has received from the insurgent government directions to sus- pend hostilities pending negotiations for the termination of the war, and that insurgent staff officers are now on their way for that purpose.

Gen. Otis' dispatch also says: "After taking Calumpit, MacArthur's division crossed the Rio Grande River in the face of great obstacles, driving the concentrated forces of the enemy back on the railroad train two miles. Macar- thur reports that the passage of the river was a remarkable military achievement, the success of which was due to the daring and determination of Col. Funston, under the dis- criminating control of Gen. Wheaton. Casualties slight; number not yet as- certained."

FIGHTING IN THE OPEN.

Manila, April 28.—At Calumpit, for the first time, a body of insurgents at- tempted to face the Americans in open ground. The Filipinos in the trenches were dispersed after making a ridicu- lously feeble resistance; but Gen. Luna's brigade came up the field from Macabebes on the double-quick, the two regiments preserving a perfect forma- tion. Gen. Luna finally succeeded in getting them spread in an extended line of battle. But when the American bullets showered thickly among them, the Filipinos again showed that no amount of drilling could fortify them suffi- ciently to make them face the American rifles.

THE TERRIBLE HEAT.

Fifty Americans were overcome by the heat, and Col. Funston dropped, utterly exhausted after the battle. The men of the Kansas regiment cheered him wildly when he was brought back. If the American troops were not fighting the heat as well as the rebels, they might pursue the rebels until they compelled them to scatter into the mountains, but the soldiers are so wilted that they must rest while the insur- gents have time to reorganize, dig new trenches, and fortify San Fernan- do, where it is expected they will at- tempt another battle.

END NEAR.

Washington, D. C., April 28.—The dis- patch from Gen. Otis was immediately telegraphed to President McKinley at Philadelphia. The officials of the war department all believe that the hostilities are about concluded.

CABLE NOTES.

Virulent smallpox has appeared si- multaneously in various parts of Ger- many.
