FORMER LONDONER GREAT BRITAIN'S IN WOODSTOCK JAIL HUNGRY HOST

Man Named Hutchinson Tells Wild and Woolly Story in Dan Thompson's Town.

The Woodstock Express of last evening had the following story of one Isaac James Hutchinson, who is now incarcerated in the Oxford county jail at Woodstock, and who was a resident of London until a few days ago:

Isaac James Hutchinson, formerly of Port Elizabeth, S. A., late of San Francisco, U. S. A., and still later of London, Ont., is spending a few days at Castle Cameron, the guest of the city, and when P. C. Dawson arrested him Monday afternoon near the Buckingham he probably made a very important capture. Time will tell.

Hutchinson himself tells quite a yarn, which, if true, means that he has traveled extensively. Also, if he makes himself as much at home and incidentally cuts up rough-house as much in other places as he did here yesterday he has certainly made a name for himself.

Born in Natal.

According to the fellow's own story he was formerly a peaceful citizen of Port Elizabeth, South Africa, and served through the war with the Natal Mounted Infantry, under Gen. Buller.

With the end of the war the roving spirit seized him, and determined to make some other country his home, he chose Canada as the best place, so he says.

Has Traveled Some.

His trade, which is that of steam-fitter and plumber, served him in good stead to secure a passage by steamer, and finally Canada was reached. Of course, the country was not what he expected, and "twas not long before he found himself in British Columbia, and later San Francisco—the former San Francisco. There he remained for a time, but came last to Omaha, where he got into trouble, and also into jail. He was serving a two and a half years' sentence at the time of the earthquake.

From Omaha the next step was to Kansas City, from there north to Chicago and later Detroit and London.

Monday according to his own account he tramped it from London to Woodstock.

In appearance he is a tall, muscular and quick, with shifting eyes, that refuse to look you square in the face for long. Otherwise the features are not unhandsome. Clothes, consisted of smock and overalls, heavy, but comfortable-looking shoes.

Sought Out Y. M. C. A.

Curiously enough he seems to have got mixed up with the Y. M. C. A. secretaries wherever he has been. In a little book he carries a Y. M. C. A. membership ticket with the cards of Messrs. McCoy, of San Francisco, Ward, of Omaha, and Bishop, of Kansas City.

It seems he was not long in town before he met Secretary A. S. Hopper of the local Y. M. C. A., who took him in hand to try and sober him up some, as he was slightly out of his head through frequent potations.

Hutchinson visited the local Y. M. C. A. rooms in search of the secretary, who, however, was not in at the time. Somehow they met and had a long talk when the above facts in connection with the prisoner were told Mr. Hopper. The secretaries of "Frisco, Omaha, and Kansas" were mentioned, already known to Mr. Hopper who talked of them with the man for a short time. When Mr. Hopper, as is his custom, manifested an interest in the man's future, Hutchinson refused to become the recipient of any favor. He protested in vigorous terms.

Shot a Man.

"I'm a bad man," he exclaimed, "I'm a devil. I have shot a man before now. I've knocked him down on the slightest provocation. You see, I've been a pugilist and can take care of myself with my hands," he hastened to explain.

He further told Mr. Hopper a part of his life out west, which was pretty bad. He has been behind the bars on frequent occasions and once, as noted above, for two and one half years.

Asking for the price of a supper, which the secretary generously gave him, the man went out and blew it in for booze. He was later pinched by Constable Dawson and went without his supper sobering up.

In Court.

When he faced Acting-Magistrate Scarff Tuesday he was evidently ill at ease. Questioned as to who and what he was and where he had been he told substantially the same story as that which Secretary Hopper heard yesterday. He was remanded for one week when Magistrate Ball will pass sentence upon his case.

Tommy Atkins Driven On by the Pangs of His Stomach.

London, July 30.—H. W. Nervinson, who has had wide experience in the British army, in the course of a review of the book "John Bull From Within," by Robert Edmondson, a former sergeant in a famous cavalry regiment, makes some pungent remarks in regard to that army. For example, he says:

"With the exception of the United States and ourselves, all nations trust to force to fill the ranks of their regular armies. What the United States trusts to do I do not know from first-hand knowledge. We in Great Britain and Ireland trust to hunger. I do not mean that without force or hunger there would be no soldiers in the world, but I do mean that without one or the other of these grim recruiting sergeants, no nation could maintain even a skeleton of its present military strength for a single year. Most nations use force; we use hunger."

"At one time I was engaged in passing the rich into the army as officers, and the great triumph of my life was when I got the stupidest man I have ever known into the Foot Guards, where he was conspicuous for his wealth rather than his stupidity. Afterwards for fifteen years I belonged to a service that brought me into close touch with a class that supplies the ranks. In that time I passed more men into the regular army than the most persuasive recruiting sergeant in St. George Barracks, and I never knew one who enlisted unless he was out of work and likely to remain so. Every man and boy who passed through my hands into the army was driven to it by hunger. Mr. Edmondson maintains that 50 per cent of our soldiers enlist in the army through hunger. My experience puts the percentage higher."

Another passage after a sarcastic reference to Rudyard Kipling's raving about the "lordliest life on earth," says:

"I can remember that the short service scheme of 1903 absolutely broke down because after three years of the 'lordliest life on earth' hardly a soul would re-enlist. Let us remember that of these recruits one in every ten deserts rather than endure it longer, and that suicides in the army are nearly four times the number of suicides in civil life. So long as officers enter the army as the best of all sporting clubs, while we treat all the Tommies as refugees in a superior workhouse, all of Secretaries of War Haldane's manipulations of the army and the organizations can produce no genuine reform."

SPENDING \$600,000

Toronto Fair Directors Getting Ready for Annual Exhibition.

Six hundred thousand dollars is a lot of money for any annual exhibition to spend in one year, especially when it is more than \$2 per head of the city population. Yet that is what the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto is doing this year. Upwards of \$400,000 is being spent on new buildings, \$50,000 in premiums, \$50,000 in attractions, and about \$75,000 in running expenses. Of the amount given in premiums something like \$35,000 is devoted to horses and live stock generally. Besides these classes large sums are given in prizes for women's and children's work, fine arts, natural history and so on. In all these classes entries close with the manager at the city hall offices in Toronto on Saturday next. The list of attractions is a very formidable one, including the latest in airships and many high-class acts direct from the capitals of Europe. The spectacle this year will illustrate the "Siege of Badajos," the most thrilling incident and brilliant feat performed by the British army, under the Iron Duke in the great Peninsular war. As usual the entertainment will close with a grand display of fireworks and the playing of eight bands in a military tattoo, the whole closing with the "Last Post."
