NOTED TRIP OF ARMY AERONAUTS

German Officers Sweep Over the
North Sea to the Middle
of England.

London, April 29.—Two German aeronauts have accomplished the feat of travelling from Leipzig, in Germany, to Leicester, in England, a distance of 550 miles.

They alighted at Enderby, near Leicester, at a quarter past 3 on Thursday afternoon, and came to London yesterday to narrate their experiences. Dr. Kurt Wegener, who was in charge of the balloon, is an experienced aeronaut, and is the holder of the record for the longest balloon voyage, namely, 53 hours. His companion was Adolph Koch.

"We went up," Mr. Koch said, "at a place named Bitterfeld, near Leipzig. We wanted to go up as high as possible, but if circumstances were favourable, a very great altitude being attained, we were ready to travel as far as we could across the surface of the earth. Our balloon, a large one, was inflated with hydrogen gas, which has four times the lifting power of ordinary lighting gas. We had ample supplies of ballast in the car, as well as provisions for two days, including tea, red wine, eggs, sandwiches and meat."

"The evening was dark when we went up, and there was a fresh wind blowing. We found it would be impossible for us to go very high, so we set off with the wind across Germany. Beneath us as we travelled we could see the lights of the towns and villages, the atmosphere being slightly illuminated by the reflection of the lights from the mist above us. It was about 10 o'clock when we saw the Hart Mountains looming in the distance, and as we did not wish to crash into them we threw out several bags of ballast and shot up into the air. We crossed range after range, descending slightly into the valleys as we went."

Lost Bearings.
"Our journey across the mountains occupied nearly an hour and a half. We had got well past them, when we found we had lost our bearings, and were travelling rapidly through the dark night, with no idea of where we were. True, the wind was more or less easterly, and we knew we must be travelling toward the coast, but that was all. When day broke we could see beneath us the canals and villages of Holland, and we knew we were well on the way to the North Sea."

"It was about midday that we heard the sound of the water beating on the Norfolk coast. We did not exactly know where we were, because the mist hid the land from us, but subsequently we proved to be near Cromer. We got our first glimpse of England almost as soon as we were over the land, the mist breaking away and giving us a splendid panorama."

"Neither Dr. Wegener nor myself had visited England before, and we were delighted at its beauty. The verdure and the cultivated fields, the villages and the meadows pleased us greatly; and so we went on until, having reached the middle of England, we decided to come down."

Almost Hit Engine.
"It was near Leicester, while we were descending, that we narrowly escaped disaster. Along a country road a traction engine was dragging several vehicles behind it. Sweeping along

over the surface of the ground we just missed it. A few seconds later our car was bumping on the meadow. We raised ourselves by the ropes above the car, meaning to jump, and then we were suddenly flung headlong over the side in the bounding progress of the balloon. The car alighted on top of us, and we were a little knocked about and our clothes torn. A minute or two later we had the willing help of some workmen, and a Mr. Johnson, who owns a country house near there, was kind enough to invite us to his place."

This is the first time that a voyage has been made by a German balloon to England. Both the aeronauts are officers in the reserve of the German army.
