Send in Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser. Question.—1. I am 35 years old, was born in the United States, and came to Canada in 1909. My father was an American and my mother a Canadian. Am I had for military service?

2. If questioned on the street, what will I say? C. H. W. will I say?

Answer — I. As your thirty-fourth birthday occurred before January I, 1917, you are not in class one, and would not be liable even if you were a Canadian. Unless your father became a naturalized British subject before you were 21 years of age, you are still a citizen of the United States, and are not subject to the provisions of the M. S. A.

2. You may be required to produce proof that you are not a British subject.

Question.—1. Will men who are incategories B, C or D, and who have reported at the postoffice, be called to the colors in December, or will A men only to taken?

2. Is a young man of 23, categorized A, who is applying for exemption on the grounds that he has to support his mother, when his father is only 55 and works every day in a mill, liable to get 15?
