HENSALL, July 18. - Hensall is known as "The Dutch Sett Onion Cenre" in Ontario and even in Canada. Moran, it is said, has been suspected for some time by the Government authorities of sending money to Germany, but previous to the United States entering the war he could not be caught as he sent the money to a friend in New York who forwarded it to his family in Germany. Since the United States entered the war, however, Moran has been sending the money to an address in Switzerland and from there it went to his family. It is estimated that since the war started he had sent close to \$500 out of the country. When he was placed under arrest today, and the evidence of his guilt was placed before him, he showed no hesitation in making a clean breast of the whole affair. A search of his room at his boarding house revealed nothing of value except receipts for the money sent. He was a reservist of the German army, and the papers sent him telling him where he was to report for duty, were found by the officers. He did not have time, however, to get out of the country, and remained in Montreal, where he was employed up to the time he came to Guelph. He took his arrest in a quiet manner, and made no complaint. He will be sent to the internment camp at Kapuskising. to his family in Germany. Since the

INVESTIGATION OF THE MESOPOTAMIA REPORT HAS BEEN DROPPED

Bonar Law Says It Will Divert Attention From War Energies.

LONDON, July 18.—Announcement was made in the House of Commons today by Andrew Bonar Law, that the Government had decided not to proceed with the proposed judicial inquiry into the report of the commission which investigated the Mesopotamia campaign. In coming to this decision, the chancellor said, the Government had been guided by the objection raised during debate on the report to a further inquiry and also was influenced by the undesirability of diverting the thought and energies of the legislature and the executive at this critical time from the prosecution of the war. The soldiers would be dealt with by the army council in the ordinary way and the decision announced as soon as possible.

The Government, on the representation of the foreign secretary, who alone was in a position to judge. Bonar Law continued, had decided that it would be detrimental to the interests of the foreign office if it should at the present juncture be deprived of the services of Baron Hardinge, under-secretary of state for foreign affairs, and had therefore refused his resignation, which had thrice been tendered. If it had been in the power of the Government to refuse the services of thrice been tendered. If it had been in the power of the Government to re-fuse the resignation of J. Austen Cham-berlain as secretary of state for India, Bonar Law added, it would have done so.

THE AJAX AGREEMENT

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT made (in duplicate) this A.D., 1917. BETWEEN-

THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF LONDON, (hereinafter called the Corporation),

OF THE FIRST PART,

THE AJAX RUBBER COMPANY OF CANADA, LIMITED, (hereinafter called the Company),

OF THE SECOND PART.

WHEREAS the Company is desirous of obtaining a site in the City of London, and of erecting thereon a factory for the purpose of carrying on its business, the manufacture of automobile tires, and the manufacturing and dealing in rubber and rubber products.

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary for the Company, in order to obtain the said site and complete the erection of its said factory and equip the same with the machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories, including crude rubber, necessary for the purpose of their business, to borrow the sum of four hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$450,000.00) by the issue of gold bonds or debentures of the Company.

AND WHEREAS the Company has requested the Corporation to guarantee the gold bonds or debentures of the Company to the extent of four hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$450,000.00), as hereinafter provided, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter mentioned, which the Corporation have agreed

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree to and with each other, as follows:

1. The Company agrees with the Corporation that, as soon as a Bylaw of the Council of the Corporation has received the assent of the electors of the said City of London authorizing the Corporation to guarantee the gold bonds or debentures of the Company to the extent of four hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$450, 000.00), as hereinafter provided, the Company will proceed to procure and will procure and pay for, a site in the said City of London, and unless there is, or are, already upon the site a building or buildings suitable for the Company's purposes, will erect and pay for a building or buildings, or such other buildings, as may be necessary for the purpose of the Company, and will install, fully equip and complete in the said building or buildings, whether those already upon the site or so to be erected, and will pay for suitable machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories, including crude rubber, at a cost for the said site, building, machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories of not less than three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00) and will have the said factory ready for operation, and in operation, within eighteen months from the passing of the said Bylaw; the said factory, when so completed, to have a capacity for the manufacturing of not less than nine hundred automobile tires per day. -

And the Company hereby agrees with the Corporation that it will submit to the Corporation, from time to time, and at all times, for its inspection and perusal, all vouchers, agreements and documents showing the expenditure of moneys by the Company upon and for the said site, building, machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories.

2. It is understood and agreed between the parties, and the Company hereby undertakes that it will issue and float four hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$450,000.00) of its gold bonds or debentures, or such other amount in its gold bonds or debentures, but not exceeding the said sum of four hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$450,000.00) as it may be necessary for the Company to issue and float in order to carry out the undertaking hereby contemplated, and that the proceeds of the said gold bonds or debentures shall be applied by the Company in making good, (and for that purpose only) the moneys expended by it in the purchase of the said site, plant and manufacturing accessories, and will execute and deliver a first mortgage or mortgages, to be made to a Trust Company, to be approved of by the Corporation, upon the site, factory, machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories of the Company as aforesaid, to secure payment of the said gold bonds or debentures, and also to secure the Corporation of, from and against liability upon its said guarantee, and such mort gage shall be in such form, and shall contain such terms, conditions and provisos as the Council of the Corporation shall require.

3. The Company further agrees with the Corporation that the Company will employ, during each and every year, for twenty years, from and after the purchase of the said site with a suitable building for the Company's factory upon it, and the installation in the said factory of the said machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories, or in the event of the Company obtaining a site for the Company's said factory without any building erected thereon, from and after the completion of the erection of the said factory upon the said site and the installation therein of the said machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories, not less than two hundred and fifty employees of whom an average of sixty per cent shall be adult males, and will pay to its employees residing in the said City of London, during each and every year of the said term of twenty years, the sum of at least two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000.00) in wages and salaries, exclusive of salaries or fees paid to any director of the Company.

4. The Company further agrees with the Corporation that the Company will procure to be transferred and delivered to the said Trust Company, securities of a class in which trustees, are, under the laws of the Province of Ontario, entitled to invest Trust funds in to be first approved of by the Corporation to an amount which shall be sufficient to provide a sum sufficient to pay off the principal of said gold bonds or debentures of the Company, at the respective maturities of said gold bonds or debentures, the same to be held as security for the said gold bonds or debentures in addition to the site, factory, machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories of the Company, as aforesaid, and that the said Trust Company will enter into an Agreement with the Corporation and the Company, that the said Trust Company will hold the said securities or any securities that may be substituted therefor, or stand in place thereof, if any, or the proceeds thereof and the income arising therefrom upon trust, that the said Trust Company

(a) In the event of the Company duly and promptly paying all the said gold bonds or debentures, and the interest thereon, when and as the same respectively become due, transfer the said securities and moneys, if any, to the Company and

(b) In the event of default being made at any time in payment of the principal of the said gold bonds or debentures of the Company, or any of them, or any part thereof, forthwith after such default, upon the request of the Corporation, transfer the said securities and pay the moneys in the hands of the said Trust Company to the Corporation, to be held by the Corporation to indemnify the Corporation of, from and against all loss, damages, costs, charges and expenses which the Corporation, or its successors, may sustain, suffer or be put to for or by reason of its guarantee of the Company's said gold bonds or debentures as aforesaid. The said Trust Agreement to be in such form and to contain such provisos, covenants and agreements as the Council of the Corporation may direct or require.

5. The Company further agrees with the Corporation that the Company will insure, and keep insured, the said factory, machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories in an insurance company, or companies, satisfactory to the Corporation, for at least the sum of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00), and make the loss, if any, under such insurance policy, or policies, payable to the said Trust Company, as its interest may appear, and shall deliver such policy, or policies, and all renewals thereof, from time to time, to the said Trust Company in due

6. The Company further agrees with the Corporation that the Company will pay the expense of submitting the said Bylaw for the assent of the electors, and will pay to the Corporation, on demand, at any time before the said Bylaw is submitted to the electors, such sum as the Council of the Corporation shall estimate to be sufficient to cover the cost of submitting the said Bylaw.

The said Mortgage shall be in the form provided for by the Short Forms of Mortgages Act, R.S.O. 1914, Chapter 117, and shall, in addition contain a proviso that in case of default for one month in payment of any of the said gold bonds or debentures, or of any panyment of interest thereon, or any part thereof, or in the event of the Company ceasing to carry on business in the said factory as manufacturers of rubber as aforesaid, or becoming insolvent, or making an assignment for the benefit of its creditors, or in the event of the continued breach of any of the covenants contained in the mortgage, and after one month's notice in writing by the said Trust Company, specifying the breach complained of, the whole amount remaining due and unpaid upon the said Mortgage shall immediately become due and payable, and shall further contain a covenant by the Company that the books of the Company shall be open for inspection by the auditors of the Corporation, or such other person or persons as may be authorized by the Council of the Corporation to inspect the same, at all reasonable times, for the purpose of ascertaining the number and character of the employees of the Company, and the amount of the weekly and annual pay roll.

8. IN CONSIDERATION WHEREOF the Corporation agrees with the Company:

(a) That the Corporation will, upon the completion of the work, and upon having vouched to it, by the Company, the expenditure of all moneys upon the said site, building, machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories as accommodation and as security for the Company, guarantee the principal and interest of a duly authorized bond issue of the Company to the amount of not more than four hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$450,000.00), payable as to one-half of the said gold bonds or debentures in ten years from the date of the issue thereof, and as to the other onehalf thereof in twenty years from the date of the issue thereof, and bearing interest at not more than six per cent per annum, payable half-yearly, provided that the Company shall have purchased and paid for a suitable site for the Company's factory, with a suitable building for the Company's factory erected upon it, and shall have installed in the said factory and paid for the said machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories, or in the event of the Company obtaining a site for the Company's said factory without any building erected thereon, provided that the Company shall have erected upon the said site, and paid for the said factory and shall have installed therein and paid for the said machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories as aforesaid, and shall have had the said factory, whether purchased or erected by the Company as aforesaid, ready for operation and in operation within eighteen months from the passing of the said Bylaw, and provided also that the Company shall have had transferred to the said Trust Company the securities mentioned in paragraph four hereof, and shall have insured the said factory, machinery, plant and manufacturing accessories in the manner, and to the extent provided for by paragraph five of this Agreement. Provided also that the said Trust Company shall have entered into an Agreement with the Corporation and the Company, that the said Trust Company will hold the securities mentioned in paragraph four hereof, or any securities that may be substituted therefor, or stand in place thereof, if any, or the proceeds thereof and the income arising therefrom upon trust, that the said Trust Company will:

(1) In the event of the Company duly and promptly paying all the said gold bonds or debentures, and the interest thereon, when and as the same respectively become due, transfer the said securities and moneys, if any, to the Company, and

(2) In the event of default being made at any time in payment of the principal of the said gold bonds or debentures of the Company or any of them, or any part thereof, forthwith, after such default, upon the request of the Corporation, transfer the said securities and pay the moneys in the hands of the said Trust Company to the Corporation to be held by the Corporation to indemnify the Corporation of, from and against all loss, damages, costs charges and expenses which the Corporation, or its successors, may sustain, suffer or be put to for or by reason of its guarantee of the Company's said gold bonds or debentures as aforesaid, and that the said Trust agreement shall be in such form and shall contain such provisos, covenants and agreements as the Council of the Corporation may direct or require,

(b) That the form of the guarantee to be given by the Corporation as aforesaid shall be as follows:

"Payment of this debenture and the interest thereon is hereby guaranteed by the Corporation of the City of London under Bylaw , passed on the

A.D. 1917.

9. This Agreement shall not be binding upon the Corporation unless and until the said Bylaw has been duly assented to by the electors of the said city, as required by the provisions of The Municipal Act.

10. The Corporation further agrees with the Company that the Corporation will, at the request, and at the expense of the Company, consent to, and endeavor to obtain, the confirmation and validation by the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, of this Agreement, if the Company shall apply to have the same confirmed and valuated by the said Legislature.

11. Time shall be of the very essence of this Agreement.
