Twenty-five homes in London may be without hard coal this winter as a result of the dilatoriness of the city council in dealing with the proposed installation of a steam heating piant on the county jail.

At the June sessions of the county council a committee was appointed to take up the matter, and it was aiso given power to proceed with the pireliminaries as soon as the city council approved the action. The city fathers were notified, and they have been investigating the proposition, but that is as far as it has gone.
