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ENTENTE TO OPEN WAR ON TURK REBELS

BRITISH AND GREEK FORCES TO OPEN ATTACK TO DRIVE TURK BANDITS FROM SCITARI

General Ironsides Will Command Attacking Forces—Campaign Will Be Waged To Clear Entire Peninsula of the Nationalists—Latest Atrocity of Radicals Was Burning To Death in Church of Nearly 2,000 Greeks—British Torpedoboats Destroy Riva, On Black Sea, a Stronghold of Insurgents.

Constantinople, July 19.—(By the Associated Press).—The British and Greeks are preparing to clear the Scutari peninsula of all Nationalists and establish a line from Ismid to Chalek on the Black Sea, which will control the bandit raids against Bosphorus towns and check communications between Angora and Constantinople through the Scutari peninsula mountains.

Gen. Ironsides of the British forces probably will command the troops. His headquarters will be Ismid. Two British divisions already are available. These will be increased to an army corps. Two Greek regiments will be used.

Turkish Nationalists continue to raid Greek villages on the south shore of the Gulf of Ismid. The Greek Patriarch reports that Fouladjik, a Greek village, with a population of 2,000, near Karamorsal, was virtually wiped out July 15. The Greeks were shut inside the church, which was set on fire. The Patriarch reports that there are only 150 Greeks alive in the village. The Entente is preparing for a campaign for the extermination of bandits. They will issue a warning that all villages which shelter or assist the Nationalists will be shelled or burned. British torpedoboats destroyers have shelled and burned Riva, a Nationalist stronghold on the Black Sea, near the entrance to the Bosphorus, and are carrying out sporadic bombardments elsewhere against the Nationalists on the Scutari peninsula, who are shortly to be attacked by land forces from the east.

SYRIA'S REPLY TO ULTIMATUM OF FRANCE IS IN ORDER BY KING FEISAL TO MOBILIZE

London, July 19.—A general mobilization in Syria has been ordered as a reply to the French ultimatum to King Feisal that he acquiesce in the French mandate for Syria, according to a dispatch to the London Times from Jerusalem.

RUSSIA READY TO SIGN PEACE WITH POLAND

British Government Receives Note From the Russian Administration.

London, July 19.—The British Government today received a note from the Russian Soviet Government stating that Russia was prepared to agree to an armistice and to make peace with Poland.

GIVES 453 DIVORCE PAPERS IN 2 WEEKS

Chicago Judge Ordered To Clean Up Calendar, Does It.

Chicago, July 19.—Judge Frank Johnston Jun. believes he has established a record in the granting of divorce decrees in the circuit court here. He has been hearing divorces two weeks and Saturday he signed his four hundred and fifty-third decree.

He was assigned to this branch of the circuit court two weeks ago with instructions to clean up the badly clogged calendar. He heard nothing but divorce cases, signing decrees during the noon recess, before court convened in the morning and after adjournment in the evening. All the cases he heard were uncontested and he was able to handle them quickly.

Many racy stories tales of wild matrimonial adventures, of cruelties and neglect of the lures of vampish women and the failings and weaknesses of half-porcelain men were to be found in the records of these more than 400 cases which turned loose 306 persons to try it all over again or forever after lodge matrimony.

SECOND PARTY OF CAMPERS LEAVES FOR PORT STANLEY

Fourteen Families, Including Fifty-Two Children, in Party.

CHECK IS SENT FOR \$50

The second camping party under the auspices of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, left today for Port Stanley. Sixty-six people left on the 10:20 L. and P. S. train, comprising fourteen families. There are 52 children. At the first camp there were fifteen families and 52 children. An evidence that people are taking an active interest was shown when Ed. Lance, secretary of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, received a check from a prominent citizen for \$50.

The second party will be under the same supervision as the first. The same rules will govern, and a very pleasant time is expected.

Ed. Lance is looking for volunteers to go to the camp once a week and give the kiddies a treat in the way of an ice cream cone or a piece of cake. The merry-go-round or some other thing that youngsters always look forward to when they go to Port.

The Rotary Club has loaned the commission half a dozen hammocks. The locations for these have not as yet been chosen, but they will be put up in the course of a few days.

The party will be in camp for twelve days, and will return on the last day of July. There will be four parties of soldiers' wives and families spend the majority of the summer at the camp.

FRIENDS OF JOACHIM DENY HIS RASH ACT RESULT OF SCANDAL

Financial Difficulties Was the Real Cause of His Melancholy.

EX-EMPRESS' FAVORITE Brooded Because of Criticism Leveled At His Father, the Former Kaiser.

Berlin, July 19.—Prince Eitel, questioned as to the motive for his brother's suicide, declined to make any statement, referring the correspondent at the same time, to the official announcement that Joachim was suffering from a "fit of excessive dementia."

The body was transferred to Potsdam chapel yesterday morning. Prince Joachim was the least talented of the emperor's sons. He held the rank of captain, but, according to statements made now, he was never actively at the front. He leaves one son.

The whereabouts of Prince Adalbert, Prince August, William and Prince Oscar are unknown. The former crown prince is reported to be staying on Rugen Island.

Friends of Prince Joachim deny stories in Berlin that his suicide was the result of a scandal. They say that aside from his marital difficulties, the prince was acutely embarrassed through his restricted finances. Like his brothers, he is believed to have been in need of funds, owing to the limited allowance from the crown funds. The government has been reported to be in financial straits.

Prince Joachim is also reported to have been brooding over the ultimate fate of the royal house, and the criticism to which his father has been subjected in Germany.

By those who were close to the Hohenzollern family when it was in power in Berlin, Prince Joachim is declared to have been the favorite son of the former German emperor, and fears are expressed that the news of his suicide may have a fatal effect on her, as she recently suffered an acute recurrence of her heart trouble.

EX-KAISER SHOCKED WHEN INFORMED OF HIS SON'S SUICIDE

Doorn, Holland, July 19.—By the Associated Press.—The announcement of Prince Joachim's death came to Doorn Castle like a thunderbolt.

The former German emperor, who has been seriously troubled by his heart ailment, is believed not to have been informed of the tragedy. He has been told of it, and has been greatly affected by the untimely end of this favorite son.

Prince Joachim saw his parents quite recently, it having been only the middle of June when he paid them a visit at Doorn Castle here.

WOMAN TO BE CANDIDATE

THREE INJURED IN AUTO CRASH

Goderich Youths Hurled Out When Speeding Car Struck Gravel.

Blyth, July 19.—Three Goderich boys were seriously injured Sunday afternoon about two miles from here when the automobile in which they were riding was hurled into a ditch by a stretch of new gravel and turned completely over.

One youth named Curry was internally injured; another, Young, had his collarbone broken, and a third, Wilson, his arm badly lacerated.

With a boy named Price, whose father owned the car, which they took from the store, they were speeding at a very fast rate when the accident occurred. It is said, the car was badly smashed.

THIEVES MAKE THIRD HAUL OF CIGARETTES FROM LOCAL FACTORY

Got A way With 8,500 "Smokes" Early This Morning.

The third robbery within three weeks in the premises of George E. Coleman & Co., cigar manufacturers, 342 Ridout street, was perpetrated some time between 1 and 3 o'clock Monday morning. The burglars secured more than 8,500 cigarettes, valued at \$150. Entrance was gained through the front door of the store, and it is believed a key was used.

In the last two robberies the thieves broke windows to gain entrance into the factory.

Mr. Coleman stated that he was at the factory Sunday afternoon and everything was in order. At 1 o'clock the policeman on the beat tried the door, and it was locked. Upon trying the door again at 3:10 o'clock he found it unlocked and notified Mr. Coleman.

Upon Mr. Coleman's arrival he found that a large supply of his stock was missing and notified the authorities at once.

Mr. Coleman stated that all the windows are covered with heavy wire screening, and this may be the reason for the burglars making their entrance through the front door.

LIGHTNING KILLED TEAM  
Longford, July 19.—During the heavy electrical storm that swept this district yesterday a valuable team of horses belonging to John Garry, while pasturing in the field were struck by lightning and instantly killed.

The team was valued at about \$300. Much grain was lying flat and much of the wheat that was cut and in the sheaf was blown down and badly soaked.

CLAIMS EXPENDITURE OF \$100,000 FOR RESERVOIR ILLEGAL

Never Approved by Legislature, Declares Labor Committee Secretary.

TREASURER'S COMMENT

Vote by People All Was Necessary, Declares Mr. Bell.

That the \$100,000 expenditure being made for an addition to the Springbank reservoir is illegal because it has not been approved by the Legislature, was the claim made today by W. G. Tite, secretary of the labor representation committee.

Although an appropriation of this amount was authorized by the people at the election in January, it needed the formal consent of the Legislature before disbursements could be issued, Mr. Tite says. With this in view a clause was inserted in the London bill. As the whole measure was thrown out by the Legislature, Mr. Tite asserts that the public utilities commission never received authority to go ahead with the work.

Further Evidence.  
Further evidence of this is to be found in the fact that the commission is asking the city council for permission to appeal to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board for authority to issue \$85,000 debentures for waterworks extensions, \$80,000 for electrical extensions, and \$100,000 for the reservoir, not stated. If the commission has power to issue the reservoir debentures, why is it making an appeal to the railway board for this amount, as well as for the electrical and water main extensions, Mr. Tite asks.

Commissioners' Comment.  
"Mr. Tite ought to put on a gown and practice law. Why doesn't he get to be a lawyer? He has bright notions like that all the time," was the reply which Commissioner J. J. Hing made to Mr. Tite's claims when interviewed by The Advertiser.

City Treasurer Bell said there was no doubt as to the legality of the debentures, as quantities of them were being sold.

"Once they were approved by the people they were quite legal," he said. "There was no need to put a clause in the London bill about them, except that it would confirm the people's vote and make it a little easier to sell the bonds. If there had been no other clauses for the bill I do not think we would have troubled to go to Toronto about this."

CAPTAIN BURTON WILL GET ANOTHER CHANCE AT SHAMROCK'S HELM

Sir Thomas Lipton Declines To Make Further Comment.

Sandy Hook, N. J., July 19.—Captain William P. Burton will be given another chance at the wheel of Shamrock IV, Sir Thomas Lipton would not say this afternoon what developments might be expected after tomorrow's race with the American defender Resolute for the America's Cup, nor would he deny that he and his advisers on the steam yacht Victoria had virtually decided to remove Captain Burton from the tiller of the cup challenger after Saturday's contest, in which Captain Burton's handling of the Lipton craft had been severely criticized.

Sir Thomas was somewhat perturbed when he read in the newspapers of plans for supplanting Captain Burton.

"Captain Burton will be at the wheel tomorrow," I understand," said Sir Thomas this afternoon. "After that, I cannot say, and, of course, I will not talk about it."

It was the general belief aboard the Victoria today that Captain Burton had asked for another chance to sail the challenger and that it had been granted him. Then, however, the captain was told that Sir Thomas showed the correspondent a telegram he had received from the president of the Yacht Club, which read: "Do not let us hear of your victory. Go on."

Sir Thomas supplied King Alfonso with the skipper and crew of the king's yacht, the Espana.

COMMODORE JARVIS MAY TAKE WHEEL OF SHAMROCK IV

New York, July 19.—According to the New York Times this morning, Commodore Aeneas Jarvis of Toronto, the well-known Canadian yachtsman, is mentioned as a possible successor to Mr. Burton as helmsman of the Shamrock IV. The newspaper says in part: "Mr. Jarvis is recognized in the United States as being an able man at the wheel, and one of the group who is most conversant with American racing conditions."

KITCHENER FIRM MAKES BIG SALE IN NEW YORK

New York, July 19.—(By the Canadian Press).—An important sale of salt cake has been made to New York interests by the Salt and Potash Company of Kitchener, Ont., of which the president is A. J. Gough of Sellers Gough, and the managing director, W. G. Welch, formerly M. P. for North Waterloo.

The company owns extensive salt deposits at Dana, Sask., a few miles from Saskatoon.

DUKE'S VISIT POSTPONED.  
Sydney, N. S. W., July 19.—That the Duke of Devonshire has again postponed his visit to Cape Breton, and will not be in Sydney until July 31, is the announcement received by Mayor Fitzgibbon from the vice-regal party's secretary. His excellency was expected here on the 21st.

Weather Notes.  
A disturbance which developed over Minnesota on Saturday has moved across the Great Lakes, causing heavy showers over the greater part of Ontario and Quebec.

In the Western Province the weather has been mostly fair and warm.

CIVILIANS IN IRISH CITY ATTACK MILITARY CONVEYANCES LOADED WITH SOLDIERS—TWENTY-NINE BOMBS THROWN—TOTAL OF CASUALTIES SINCE START OF REIGN OF TERROR LAST NIGHT IS WELL OVER THE 100 MARK—GUERRILLA TACTICS ARE USED BY ATTACKERS.

Cork, July 19.—Two military lorries loaded with soldiers, which passed through the streets of Cork at 3 o'clock this morning, were attacked by civilians with bombs and blown up. Between 60 and 70 soldiers were injured. The civilians threw 29 bombs.

This attack followed a night of terror into which the city was plunged as a result of street fighting, in which Sinn Feiners and the military participated. Two men were killed and some 40 were wounded in the gun fighting, which brought the total of casualties well over the 100 mark.

The Sinn Feiners used the guerrilla tactics which had been outlined in the plan of campaign of the Republican army.

YOUNG WOMAN SHOTS MAN WHO DECLINED TO LOVE HER INSTEAD OF WIFE AND FAMILY

Pauline Meglitsch of Chicago Commits Suicide After Firing Bullet Into Head of Julius Jonas—Woman Leaves a Note Explaining Reason For Act—Jonas Is in Hospital in a Critical Condition.

Chicago, Ill., July 19.—Miss Pauline Meglitsch, 28 years old, a bookkeeper, shot Julius Jonas, 48 years old, a traveling salesman, and then killed herself in her home on the north side yesterday, according to the police.

Jonas, who has a wife and four children, was taken to a hospital, where it was reported his condition is critical. He had been separated from his wife about five years, the police were told, and had lived with the Meglitsch family several months.

Last March, Mrs. Jonas, who is a sister of Leo Felt, New York music publisher, died and for separate maintenance against her husband, naming Pauline Meglitsch, officials said, but a conference in the office of Mrs. Jonas' attorney, a reconciliation was said to have been effected.

The bullet severed Jonas' optic nerve leaving him blind. In a letter addressed to the public, the woman said: "I tried to get Julius to love me last night but he refused. He said he loved his wife and family more than me. He said he was going back to his wife and family and he seemed to mean what he said."

RAILWAY CHIEFS TO PASS UPON BOARD'S AWARD

Meeting of Union Officials Is Being Held in Chicago. 2,000,000 ARE AFFECTED

If Rejected, Concerted Action Will Be Taken by the Men.

Chicago, July 19.—The first grand council meeting for more than a year of executives, general chairman and general committee members of the sixteen recognized railroad brotherhoods operating in Chicago today to pass upon the award of the railway labor board. The board's decision, it has been announced, will be made public tomorrow.

Although the board has no legal jurisdiction over Canada, its decision will, in fact, be operative in the Dominion as the Canadian Pacific is reported to have undertaken to incorporate the findings of the United States board in an agreement with the Canadian brotherhood.

According to union rule all questions of a wage increase must be submitted to a referendum vote of the entire membership of the unions, but it was pointed out today that the call for the grand council stated the purpose of its gathering to be "to consider and pass upon the award made by the board."

Under these circumstances, it was not known whether the board's award would be submitted to a referendum or whether final action would be taken by the union chiefs in session here. Leaders today declined to comment on the matter.

2,000,000 Are Affected.  
In connection with the discussion of probable referendum tomorrow, it was pointed out that a vote by the entire membership of the brotherhoods would require a month or more, and that the union leaders were opposed to such a delay. Leaders today declined to comment on the matter.

The wage increase asked by railroad workers of whom there are 2,000,000 would total more than \$600,000. The demands range from 10 per cent for shopmen to 15 per cent for maintenance of way employees.

AUSTRALIAN BISHOP MAY BE BARRED FROM ENTERING IRELAND

London, July 19.—The question as to whether the Most Rev. Daniel Mannix, archbishop of Melbourne, Australia, shall be barred from Ireland, in view of his recent utterances in the United States, is under consideration by the British Government.

This statement was made by Andrew Bonar Law, the Government spokesman, in answer to a question as to whether the Government would not prevent Archbishop Mannix from visiting Ireland, because his presence and speeches might be likely to increase the difficulties already existing.

Mr. Bonar Law was asked by a member of the House whether representations had been made to the Vatican regarding the speeches of Archbishop Mannix.
