BRITISH AND GREEK FORCES TO OPEN ATTACK TO DRIVE TURK BANDITS FROM SCUTARI

General Ironsides Will Comma nd Attacking Forces—Cam-SECOND PARTY OF paign Will Be Waged To Clear Entire Peninsula of the Nationalists—Latest Atrocity of Radicals Was Burning To Death in Church of Nearly 2,000 Greeks-British Torpedoboats Destroy Riva, On Black Sea, a Stronghold of Insurgents.

Constantinople, July 19.—(By the Associated Press).—The CHECK IS SENT FOR \$50 British and Greeks are preparing to clear the Scutari peninsula of all Nationalists and establish a line from Ismid to Chileh on the Black Sea, which will control the bandit raids against Bosphorus towns and check communications between Angora and Constantinople through the Scutari peninsula mountains.

Gen. Ironsides of the British forces probably will command the troops. His headquarters will be Ismid. Two British divisions already are available. These will be increased to an army corps. Two Greek regiments will be used.

Turkish Nationalists continue to raid Greek villages on the south shore of the Gulf of Ismid. The Greek Patriarch reports that Fouladjik, a Greek village, with a population of 2,000, near Karamorsal was virtually wiped out July 15. The Greeks were Karamorsal, was virtually wiped out July 15. The Greeks were shut inside the church, which was set on fire. The Patriarch reports that there are only 150 Greeks alive in the village. The second party will be under the same supervision as the first. The same rules will govern, and a very pleasant bandits. British torpedoboat destroyers have shelled and ruined Riva, a Nationalist stronghold on the Black Sea, near the entrance to the Bosphorus, and are carrying out spasmodic bombardments elsewhere against the Nationalists on the Scutari peninsula, who are shortly to be attacked by land forces from the east.
