Gossip of the Horses.

Attention is drawn to the opening of the

Jockey Joe Notter, the leading rider at New Orleans, came in for a bit of severe discipline after the last race Monday at City Park because of rough riding. The lad was suspended for two weeks by the officials and given a fine of \$50, and in addition his mount, Lancasterian, was disqualified. Notter's trouble came from an aggravated instance of rough work in the saddle.

Prix de la ville de Nice, a handicap steeplechase to be run on Sunday, June 12, at Nice, on the Epsom course, will be worth \$12,000. This race, which will be worth about \$25,000, E. R. Schaff's aged gelding Journaliste is top weight at 164 pounds. The distance is three miles and a furlong. Lord Carnarvon, an English turfman well known in America, has entered his gelding Carnegie in the \$12,000 Prix de Monte Carlo, a hurdle handicap, to be run on Thursday, Jan. 16.
