NO MORE BAND CONCERTS TO BE HELD IN DUNDURN

Crowds Spoil the Flower Beds—Sons of England Pass Important Resolutions.

HAMILTON, Aug. 12.—(Special.)—Owing to the damage to flower beds when the last band concert was held in Dundurn Park the parks board this afternoon decided that no more band concerts would be allowed in the park, and Harvey Park will be used for that purpose in the future. The board will take over the Sir Allan McNab burial plot and an acre of ground adjoining and all it will have to pay will be about \$400 for a monument for the plot. The A.O.F. was granted permission to hold a Sunday service in Dundurn early in October.

The fruitgrowers' picnic, which was to have been held at the Brant House to-day, had been called off on account of the rain, after about 1200 had assembled.

Street Railway Receipts.
The street railway receipts for the quarter ending June show an apparent falling off. It is charged that the company's policy is to blame for this, as it has practically cut out the best line business, which, during the hot weather always brought in a handsome revenue. The company has apparently been trying to divert this business to the streetcar.

The receipts for the quarter amounted to \$73,373 as compared with \$73,862 for the corresponding quarter last year, a decrease of \$489. The receipts for the half year, however, show an increase of about \$1600. Even some of the Catholic clique of aldermen say they will not consent to a new deal with the company unless it is first sanctioned by the people.

Sons of England Convention.
Some important business was transacted at this morning's session of the S.O.E. In the future no benefits will be paid in case of death, but only in case of death after seven days. In cases of reinstatement for a period of four weeks or less no sick or funeral benefits will be paid. There will be no possibility of evading fines, which will be treated as arrears in dues. A proposal to give the supreme lodge greater power in investing lodge funds was voted down. The powers of the chairman of the arbitration committee were increased, and lodges were given permission to pay their treasurers. The Supreme treasurer and trustees must be under a guarantee company in future.
