



Toronto and Hamilton Interests Involved-Compelled to Fight.

HAMILTON, Dec. 31.—(Special.)—As has been announced in The World, a big electric merger, taking in both the Toronto and Hamilton interests is in the process of formation, and will be an accomplished fact early in the new year. This means that the fight of the ctric ring to fasten itself on the people of this province will be continued on a more gigantic scale and with greater fury than ever. In fact, it looks as if the electric fight was just

looks as if the electric fight was just beginning.

It is Justice Anglin's decision freeing the City of Hamilton from the Dominion Power and Transmission Co. that has hastened the completion of the plans for the merger. The long period during which the Cataract people were the favorate barbainers with the Dominion Government for water power, their cheap development and their undisturbed monopoly enjoyed such prosperity that they ware able to pay off the bonds issued to make extensions and divids up amongst themselves huge blocks of watered stock covering the increased value of their plant, gave them a species of swollen head and they were inclined to regard with contempt financiers who had to put real money into the development of Niagara power. So long as they had Hamilton tied up and had soms prospect of continuing the hold on Brantford and had a good market in Welland and St. Catharines for their power, they were a good market in Weilstin and st. Catharines for their power, they were inclined to sit back and let the other companies fight their own battles. Justice Anglin's decision and the prospects of legislation by the Whiting government has caused them to hustle into an alliance with the other interests. They are equipped for developing 1000 horse power more than they have a market for now, and by the installation of more machinery can develop 20,000 horse power more. They want

an assured market for this and for the business they will lose in Hamilton and Brantford by the introduction of the hydro-electric power.

The directors, while denying that any formal proposition with regard to the merger has been adopted by the board, make no bones of the fact thatthey have been discussing amongst them-selves the advisability of forming an alliance with the other companies. With the whole field threatened by the invasion of hydro-electric power, they say they are compelled to put up a fight for their very existence, and de-clare that with the other companies

will wage a fight against the govern-ment project in every town and city where plans are being made to intro-duce government power. They admit they are planning to take a hand in the fight in Toronto, and it is probable that the 30,000 horse power that they are capable of developing will be placed at the disposal of the merger, to be offered at cut rates wherever it is thought it can be used to the best advantage to puncture the government's project.
