JAP HONEYMOON SO GOOD REPETITION IS SECURED

Spectacular Performance in Massey Hall in Aid of Broadway Boys' Institute.

One of the most charming, vivacious and delightfully melodious entertainments seen in Toronto for some time was presented at Massey Hall last night in the "Japanese Honeymoon."

When programs were produced for sweet charity's sake the result is not always so happy, but in the present instance everyone is to be congratulated and those who were absent on the additional opportunity that is to be afforded to-morrow evening to visit the show at popular prices, 25, 35 and 50 cents.

From the moment the prelude curtain rose till the national anthem everything went with a swing and without hitch, and if any suggestion of improvement could be made it must be confined to the idea of substituting Canada for the United States in the march of nations with England, Ireland and Scotland. The stars and stripes received rapturous applause all the same.

Miss Thelma Gilmore in the part of Sang Toy had the heaviest part to sustain. Her splendid voice and cultured singing, her gay and rollicking acting and clever dancing were a notable success and met with repeated encores. Her versatility was evident in such contrasted numbers as "Jewel of Asia," "Why Don't You?" "Crisis," "Underneath a Parasol" and the Honeymoon song "Miss Beatrice Shaud sang the rather pretty "Pettie Tonkinose" with verve and she was even more attractive in later numbers.

Miss Birdie Kenny was very sweet and refined in the Mexican Love Song, Miss Blanche Flick was most charming as the Fairy Queen in "Kiss, Kiss, Kiss," sung with Jack Challes. Miss Emily Brooks sang her duet with Kingsley Brooks with excellent taste, and Miss Helen Boisseau had an ovation in the Deutschland number, with its quaint wooden shoe dance, the prettiest on the list. She also was delightful in "Cordelia." Miss Pearl Maunth was very fetching in "Nobody Knows the Answer" and was handsome and stately as the drum major in the very clever and well done march of the patons.

The Vesper Quartet sang several well received selections and Hartwell De Millie was very popular as the Emperor with several good songs. Geo. Dickson, the English ensign, was dashing and naval and sang capital, and Jack Challes sustained his reputation as a tasteful singer. The whole of the music was patronized by the and the Fralick orchestra supported the choruses with much judgment.

The dances were as good as the rest of the performance and from the prettiest children's ballet of 70 fairies thru all the Geisha, Mexican, Gipsy and other dances to the end the stage presented a constant succession of brilliant pictures, costumed and staged with skill and art. The element of humor was not wanting at any time, and the Royal Attendant of Russell M. Hillman was very funny.

End of Gold Cup Scandal.

The \$5000 gold cup was won by Maj. Delmar, owned by E. E. Smathers, C. K. G. Billings, owner of Lou Dillon, charged that his mare had been doped.

There was presented in civil courts and trotting courts a very clever fabric to wear out this theory, but it was determined by the board of review that there was no evidence to show that Lou Dillon had been doped.

One Eddie Molloy, stableman, testified that he had seen Millard Sanders, admitted to retain jurisdiction of the cup.
