Greath Athlete Reported Killed

The death of Capt. Wyndham Halliwell, Highland Light Infantry, who was killed in action on March 21, according to announcement from London, removes one of the world's finest athletes. He is best remembered for his performance at the Olympic Games in London in 1908, when he broke the record for the quarter mile, running the distance in 48.2 seconds.

"Wonder" is School Boy.

Pillmore K. Robinson, a nineteen-year old "wonder golfer," who won not only match, but double-play honors, in Fife-hurst's annual United North and South amateur golf championship tournament, two weeks ago, began golf as a school-boy, under the tutelage of Donald J. Ross.

Last year Robinson won the qualifying round of the United with 79 and 76—155 total—which he equalled this year with 71 and 84—155—one stroke better than Oulmet, Travis and Gullford. In match play H. K. Kerr, of Eleanore, Jesse Gullford of Intervale, Robert Hunter of Wee Burn and H. J. Topping of Greenwick were the victims in the order named.

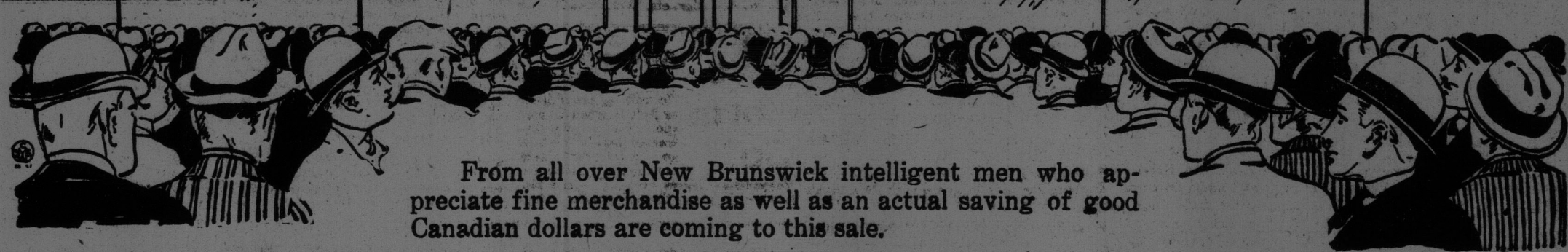
