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BEGINS 69TH ANNIVERSARY OBSERVANCES

Exmouth St. United Church Starts Week of Special Services

SOCIAL SERVICE SECRETARY HERE

Anglican Mission in City—Matter of Rinks Used on Sunday

A week of special observances in connection with the 69th anniversary of Exmouth street United church opened yesterday, when large congregations attended the services both night and morning and the special preacher, Rev. W. H. Harts, D.D., of Amherst, delivered inspirational addresses. Rev. E. Styles, pastor of the church, conducted the services and the full choir of the church rendered special music most effectively. Very large offerings were given for church funds.

Tonight the service will be conducted by the Young People's League and there will be a musical program and an address by Rev. F. T. Bertram. On Tuesday night Bayard Curtis will give an organ recital in the church and will be assisted by Mrs. L. V. Lingley, Miss E. R. Conrad, E. G. Clavan and J. Smith.

CONGREGATIONS TO UNITE. The Waterloo street Baptist congregation will unite with the Exmouth street congregation on Wednesday night, when there will be a service of song and devotion and Rev. E. R. McWilliam, of Waterloo street church, will be the preacher. The anniversary observances will be continued with a supper on Friday night when Rev. B. G. Fulton, moderator of Saint John presbytery, will be the speaker.

The anniversary celebration will close next Saturday when Rev. Clarence Mackinnon, D.D., Halifax, N. S., president of the Maritime conference of the United Church, will be the special preacher.

SOCIAL SERVICE. The work of the Social Service Council of Canada was the theme of a special sermon delivered yesterday by Rev. J. P. Jones, B. D., general secretary of the council, in preaching in St. David's church in the morning and in the evening. Mr. Jones was formerly minister of St. John's church, Winnipeg, and is making his first visit to Saint John since his appointment to the general secretaryship of the council in succession to the late Rev. J. G. Shearer, whose death took place last March.

Rev. Neil MacLachlan, of Bathurst, is president of the provincial organization and Rev. A. L. Tedford, of Saint John, is secretary. At the annual meeting Mr. Jones will speak on the gambling laws and general objects of social service work. Dr. Mabel Hargrave will speak on the care of mentally deficient. Child welfare subjects are also to be specially discussed, Mr. Jones said yesterday.

TO SPEAK ELSEWHERE. After leaving Saint John Mr. Jones will visit a number of other centres in New Brunswick, among them, St. Stephen, Sussex, Moncton, Sackville, Campbellton, Bathurst, Newcastle and Woodstock.

TO TOUR CANADA. Rev. R. L. Barnes, C.K., a missionary of the Community of the Resurrection, who is to give a series of missions and retreats in Anglican churches throughout Canada, was one of the passengers who arrived here yesterday on the Canadian Pacific steamship.

MORE CANADIANS RETURNING HOME

December Showed Largest Number Since Officials Began Keeping Count

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—In the month of December, 1925, a total of 7,923 Canadians who had been living in the United States for six months or longer, returned to the Dominion, according to a statement of the Department of Immigration.

For the first nine months of the present fiscal year the total is 23,523. The December total is a record since April 1925, when the department began to keep a count of Canadians returning to their own country. It is 2,796 higher than the previous best monthly total of 5,127, recorded in July, 1924. The increase in the movement of Canadians returning from the United States is regarded by immigration officials as indicative of the improving business conditions throughout the Dominion.

Immigration for October, November and December, 1925, also shows an increase of 1,671 over the corresponding months of 1924.

The total immigration to Canada for the nine months of the present fiscal year ended December 31, was 74,115. Of this number 31,094 were British, 14,488 from the United States and 28,533 from other countries.

NEWSPRINT RACE IS A VERY CLOSE ONE

Canada and United States Running Neck and Neck in Production

MONTREAL, Feb. 8.—In the neck-and-neck race which Canada and the United States have been running for several years for the position of world's greatest newsprint producer, Canada was ahead of the United States for each of seven months during 1925. It was disclosed at the annual meeting of the Newsprint Service Bureau in the Ritz-Carlton Hotel. The amounts by which the United States production exceeded Canadian during the other five months, however, were such as to give a slight advantage to the United States for the year's total production. This advantage amounted to 8,000 tons only. Final figures show that during 1925 the United States produced 1,530,000 tons of newsprint paper and Canada 1,522,000 tons.

North America's entire output was 3,052,000, or 9 per cent more than 1924. Canadian production of 91,000 tons, and Mexico 13,000 tons. North America's consumption was equivalent to 98 per cent of the production. Six per cent of the world's supply was produced in North America, the world total being roughly 5,000,000 tons.

Canada leads in 1925 in percentage of increase in production. The United States output was 9 per cent more than in 1924.
