

## WOULD EXTEND HEALTH SERVICE

Director Returns from Trip  
to St. Andrews and  
St. Stephen.

Miss H. Meiklejohn, director of public health nursing services, returned to the city yesterday from St. Andrews and St. Stephen, where she had made short visits in the interests of the nursing services in the province. The plan was very favorably received by the local committee which has charge of the financing of the nursing service in St. Andrews.

In St. Stephen Miss Meiklejohn met with Miss Murray, public health nurse, who is doing excellent work in that community. Miss Murray conducts a well baby clinic and has done extensive child welfare work. Miss Meiklejohn spoke of the fact that there have been only two infant deaths in one year among the children. Miss Murray has had under her supervision, a fact which was attributed to the health measures which she had been advocating.

 Rev. R. O. Armstrong, prominent in Manitoba Methodist circles, and a former secretary of the Manitoba Sunday School Association, died at Hartney, Man., on July 28. Mr. Armstrong, a native of King's County, Nova Scotia, went to the west in 1904.

**Wallace Downey.**  
 Word received by relatives in Amherst announced the sudden death of Wallace Downey, head of the Downey Shipbuilding Co., at Staten Island, He died in New York. Mr. Downey was a native of Miunde, N.
