

The early closing of stores was by agreement, and presumably was not universal; even in 1923 we have not attained that goal. Those who entered into the agreement in 1856 closed their stores at seven o'clock in September, October, November, March and April; at six o'clock in December, January and February; and at eight o'clock in May, June, July and August. On Saturdays and the eve of public holidays nine o'clock was the closing flour. As there was then no daylight time or standard time, and, as there were no suburban trains to catch, the whole matter of opening and closing and being on time was very simple.
