That Moncton is a growing city is something that need scarcely be stated. There are few places, either in Canada or the United States, that can show a greater increase in population and in the evidences of material wealth. The civic tax bills are now being sent out, and while such things are not regarded as pleasant reminders, they afford some satisfaction. The assessors' books show that the total taxable valuation of the city of Moneton this year amounts to \$22,367,425, as compared with \$19,447,675 last year, and about six million ten years ago, when Mr. Price, who recently retired from the office of crief assessor, took charge. The city valuation for the past two years is made up as follows:—

. \$5,386,210 \$5,557,770 7,916,730

\$2,919,550, or fifteen per cent. In addition to the above, property exempt from taxation is of the estimated value of about ten million dollags. This includes, of course, all the land and buildings of the Canadian National Railway system, the city property, parks, city hall and market, fire stations and school buildings and church properties.

The valuation of all land, buildings, incomes and personal estate in the city of St. John is this year \$55,596,500, an increase of \$4,886,600, but a million and a half of this increase comes from property which previous to this year had been exempt from taxation, so that practically the actual increase in valuations in Moncton is nearly as large as in St. tically the actual increase in valuations in Moncton is nearly as large as in St. John, while the percentage rate of increase is two and a half times as great. Other evidences of Moncton, progress are found in the postal revenue, which now exceeds \$300,000 a year, ranking this city with St. John and Halifax; also in


