DISAPPROVES OF TAX EXEMPTION

That the idea of exempting Victory loan holdings from taxation is bound to lead to difficulties in the future was the statement made to a Telegraph reporter last night, by Hon. W. S. Fielding, one time federal finance minister and outstanding Canadian statesman, who was at the Royal Hotel. Mr. Fielding is still full of vigor and vim and is en route to Digby, where he will spend several weeks among relatives and friends.

"The next Victory loan," he said in reply to a question, "of course, we will raise it. It may be a little more difficult to raise than the former ones, but we'll get the money all right, although I believe that we will have to organize very thoroughly to do it. It will be harder to raise each succeeding year than if a man has a dollar and you take it from him he cannot give it to you again when next you come around."

With respect to the scheme of exempting Victory bonds from income taxation Mr. Fielding said that many of the wealthiest people were putting their money into this type of investment.

"Suppose you are a wealthy man," he said, citing a case, "and I am a poor worker and we are neighbors. You hold a lot of Victory bonds and I hold none, because I am poor. I have to pay

up to the bill when the assessor comes round and you are exempt because your money is invested in Victory bonds. It is not fair, but notwithstanding that necessity I feel confident that he is making a grave error in exempting the Victory bonds," he concluded.

PASS \$17,000 MARK.

It was announced last evening that \$17,088.36 was the total which the Navy League fund in the city had reached. J. M. Christie, of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, where the counting of the money received with done, said that it was not at all unlikely that the fund might be increased by about \$1,000 more, as there were several promised subscriptions which had still to be collected, and these were, some of them, for sums varying from \$10 to \$12 and upwards to \$50.

Economy Hints For Housewives

Meatless Meats and Iceless Icebox Demonstrated in Calvin Hall Yesterday

This week's Friday demonstration in the Calvin hall under the auspices of the Housewives' League was greatly appreciated by an unusually large number of interested members and friends and the talks which were also given were particularly appropriate. Miss Winter, former superintendent of Women's Institutes for the province showed how to make meatless supper or dinner dishes and explained how properly balanced meals should be planned. One of the new pyrex dishes was used and proved very satisfactory. Mrs. Richard Hooper, convener of the demonstrations, had on exhibition a very simple form of iceless refrigerator which she had been asked to show. The catalogue of the combination exhibition of the war gas association and the St. John Housewives' League were distributed and members were specially urged to compete in the exhibition in the canned goods and war bread classes.

Not Ahead of St. John. Mrs. Hooper, in opening the meeting, drew the attention of the members to the fact that Montreal was making special arrangements to have demonstrations by a French chef of the best ways of using good food that was often discarded. Among his chief dishes was the cod's head chowder which Mrs. Raymond had so ably demonstrated at one of the previous meetings. Mrs. Raymond was very highly commended on the most excellent work which she has done for the league.

In connection with the exhibition of canned goods and breads Mrs. Hooper asked that every member make a special effort to send in at least an exhibit. Announcement was made by her that the next league meeting would be held on Monday evening and would be presided over by Mrs. Lawlor. Its chief subject for consideration would be the sending out of the voluntary rationing scheme.

Miss Winter is a most capable demonstrator and her method of showing how to make vegetable loaf and mock ham-burg steak was followed with much attention and interest. She added greatly to the value of her demonstration by giving recipes for the dishes made. When the cooking process was completed the mock steak and vegetable loaf were passed round and were unanimously agreed to be very tempting and purchasers were not hard to find.

Iceless Refrigerator. Mrs. Hooper's iceless refrigerator proved to be as simple and easy construction as her fireless cooker. It was merely a table with two shelves on the top of which was placed a basin of cold water in which a cloth was placed so that part was always in the water while its ends were gathered together into a pan beneath the table. The cloth completely covered the second shelf on which the food was placed. There were two essentially to an iceless refrigerator. Mrs. Hooper said and were, first, absolute cleanliness and frequent sterilization of all parts and secondly a situation in a direct current.

THINGS THAT MUST NOT BE DONE

In order that the general public may be better acquainted with the desires of the military and naval authorities in conducting their activities so as to better conserve the safety of the ports in the city, the following list of things that must not be done has been passed at Ottawa outlining the whole matter in a most lucid manner.

The first section of the order points out that no person shall publish or communicate any information with respect to the movement or disposition of any of the forces, ships, or war materials of his majesty or of any of his majesty's allies, or with respect to the plans of any naval or military operations by such forces or ships, or with respect to any works or measures undertaken for or connected with the fortifications or defence of any place, if the information is such as is calculated to be or might be directly or indirectly useful to the enemy.

The bug infecting the amateur photographer is dealt a stiff blow when the second section of the order points out that no person, without sufficient permission, may take any photograph, sketch, plan, model or other representation of any dock or harbor work or in connection with a defended harbor, or no person in the vicinity of any such work, shall without permission have in possession any photographic or other apparatus or other material or thing suitable for use in making any such representation.

The order provides that no person shall tamper with any telegraphic apparatus or telephone connection, or any device visual or otherwise for the purpose of signalling, nor shall they be permitted to have in their possession any apparatus for the tapping of messages sent by wireless telegraphy or otherwise.

The order goes fully into the matter of the displaying of lights outside of dwellings and gives the military and naval authorities the power to order people to remain within their dwellings between certain hours, and demands that persons may not have in their

F. C. ROBINSON IS APPOINTED

Third Member of Compensation Act Board—Government Completes Sitings

The Workmen's Compensation Act board was completed last night by the appointment of F. C. Robinson, of Moncton, as the third member. The board is now composed of J. H. A. Black, chairman, and Frank C. Robinson. The third member appointed last night is a former member of the board, and is now an alderman there and has for years been closely allied with commercial and industrial activities. The news of the appointment will be received in Moncton with much pleasure as well as throughout every section of the province where Mr. Robinson is known. He is a brother of Hon. C. W. Hanson of Moncton.

The section of the act relating to the organization of the board and the classification and levying of assessment of the amounts to be paid by the different industries together with that portion of the act dealing with the employers of labor to compile their estimate and pay rolls and such other information as the board may call for within the provision of the act will be promulgated by an order-in-council. The other sections of the act will probably be promulgated on January 1, 1936, as by that time the levying of assessment will be completed.

The minister of agriculture has been receiving congratulations on all fronts for the success of his greater production campaign. The crops throughout the province have never been so large before in the history of the country. He is especially pleased with the ready response of the farmers to the request that they increase their production of wheat. In the early part of the year the department distributed among the farmers 110,000 bushels of seed grain which has turned out splendidly and will materially assist in the relief of war time food conditions throughout the province. It will, no doubt, be a surprise to many to learn that the estimate of the total yield of grain this year in the province of New Brunswick alone is 1,200,000 bushels. This wheat at 22¢ per bushel will enrich the farmers of the province to the extent of \$260,000.

Owing to the increased production of wheat the mill capacity of the province is not sufficient, it is believed, to grind all the wheat produced here. In view of this fact the government has decided to increase its bonus to fifty barrel per day mills from \$1,000 to \$2,000, while the bonus to twenty-five barrel mills is \$1,000.

In regard to the organization of the forestry service, this work has been completed. It is worthy to note that this is the first time in the history of New Brunswick that the appointments to the forestry service have been made absolutely on merit and the factor of patronage did not in any way affect the appointments. These men have passed the examinations and are qualified for the work, and will take up their duties at once. Their work will consist chiefly of the conservation of the forests, the protection of game and prevention of forest fires, and the selling of logs. It is the purpose of the department of lands and mines that all logs be sealed that are taken off the crown lands. Heretofore not over ten per cent and in many cases only five per cent of the logs were actually sealed, and the balance was

more estimate. In this connection it is provided that the logs be sealed in the yards.

The new regulations make it necessary that every operator maintain what is known as a "shanty book" in which he must enter up, daily, the number of logs he cuts.

Many matters of routine business were taken up during the session of the council which came to a close last night.

BIG PLANS FOR THE BEERSVILLE MINES

The Telegraph learned last night that in connection with the development of the mining areas at Beersville, Kent county, some of the most outstanding industrial men of the province of Nova Scotia are identified with the movement. The company has been capitalized at \$100,000, and among its directors are Colonel D. H. McDougall,

president and general manager of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, C. J. Burchill, K. C. of Halifax; B. Pearson, of the Morning Chronicle, Halifax; James T. Cumming, president of James Cumming & Son, of New Glasgow (N. S.); George B. Burchill, B. S. of North Sydney, and J. D. Betts, of Joggins Mines.

Mr. Gage, who represents the United States interests who own the road between Beersville and Adamsville, likely to arrive in St. John today in order to meet representatives of the new company and discuss the situation. Already the company is developing the areas and is holding some coal and expects to be able to get an output of 100 tons per day in the vicinity of 100 tons if their plans work successfully.

The provincial government has taken the warmest interest in the work, and the representatives of the company are loud in their praises of Premier Foster and his colleagues in the help which they have extended to the new industry. The provincial law administrator, Dr. J. H. Prink, has also been interested in the proposition and has rendered valuable and appreciated aid to the new concern.

PRESIDENT LENINE AND ASSAILANT WEAKER

London, Sept. 6.—The condition of Nikolai Lenine, the Bolshevik premier, against whose life an attempt was made last week, is weaker, according to a Russian wireless dispatch received here tonight, from Moscow. His temperature is higher as the result of effusion of blood in the pleura and shoulders. Amsterdam, Sept. 6.—Dora Kaplan, a member of the Social revolutionary party, was last Friday, attempted to assassinate Nikolai Lenine, the Bolshevik premier, is in a critical condition at a hospital in Moscow as the result of a Russian handling by a mob after the attack, says a dispatch from Moscow to the Russian Westphalian Gazette, of Essen. The Bolshevik commissioner of justice, the dispatch adds, has ordered that everything be done to save the woman's life for the purpose of tracing the "plot" which undoubtedly existed."
