SUITS FOR SHIPWRECKED

Since the tragedy of the Titanic hundreds of ideas and inventions have been brought before shipping companies and the board of trade authorities, with the object of minimizing the risk of life at sea.

Perhaps the most ingenious of these ideas is a combination of life-belt and suit made of water light canvas, which envelops the whole person. The suit has sleeves ending in gloves, and there is a port hole in the head, which can be closed when the weather is rough.

When this port-hole is closed air enters through a tube above the head, this tube being so constructed that no water can enter.

Furnished with this device, it is said that a passenger might be thrown into mid-Atlantic and live in comfort for many days, while waiting to be picked up, for the suit can be equipped with sufficient food and drink to keep a shipwrecked passenger alive for a week or more.

A man or woman using this device stands with feet in a sort of bucket, which forms the base. This bucket takes in a certain quantity of water, which acts as ballast and keeps the life-saver and its occupant upright.

Furthermore, the apparatus is provided with a revolver, and signal-light with which the shipwrecked passenger can signal for help by day or night. Attached to the apparatus are ropes by which two or three people can keep themselves afloat if they have not the good fortune to have one of these life-saving suits.

The suit is the invention of a German named Gustave Horn and he declares that it will deprive shipwreck of all its terrors in all circumstances.

DOCTORS KEEP BUSILY AT IT

Much Accomplished Yesterday and Social Side of Gathering Well Enjoyed—Vancouver Next Year

Were one to visit the armory and watch the doctors in session there, for a day, he would be inclined to believe that they are busy men. A glance at the work that they went through yesterday will give the public some idea of the rate at which they are traveling. The executive met at 9 a.m.; at 9.30 the meetings opened in the six sections; at 12.45 luncheon was served; at 2 p.m. the sections were in full swing again; at 5.15 the general session was on, and at 10.15 the visitors were the guests of the local medicals at the Imperial Theatre, and yet some of the doctors and their wives found time to enjoy the pleasant air and nice time at the garden party on Dr. V. Anglin's grounds in Fairville, Vancouver, today will see the same measure of activity.

Most interesting to the general public in yesterday's sessions of the Canadian Medical Association, meeting were papers read in the public health section. The papers by Dr. J. H. Beside Dr. Byce's two papers, others were read by Dr. C. Graham Rogers, New York, and Dr. M. M. Seymour, Regina. In the laboratory section, the following took part in the proceedings: Dr. D. Fraser Harris, Halifax; Dr. L. J. Rhea and E. H. Falconer, Montreal; A. B. MacCallum, Toronto; Dr. H. McKee, Montreal, and Dr. J. J. Oger, Montreal. The speaker in the X-ray section were Dr. S. W. Ellsworth, Boston; Dr. W. H. Eagar, Halifax; Dr. A. W. George, Boston; Dr. W. L. Wall, Richmond, and Dr. A. L. Gray, Richmond, Va.
