HAZEN'S UNCLE DEAD IN CAPITAL

Beckwith Was Five Years Mayor of Fredonia

About 70 Years Old—The former Mayor of Fredonia, N. B., died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. J. D. H. Beckwith, at the age of 70 years.

Mr. Beckwith was born in the town of Fredonia, N. B., in 1840. He was a member of the Republican party and served as mayor of Fredonia for five years.

He was a man of considerable ability and was highly respected in his community. He was survived by a wife and several children.

Funeral services will be held at the residence of his daughter on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

He was a member of the Methodist church and was a devoted member of the same.

JOHN E. REDMOND THROWN FROM HIS WAGON AND HURT

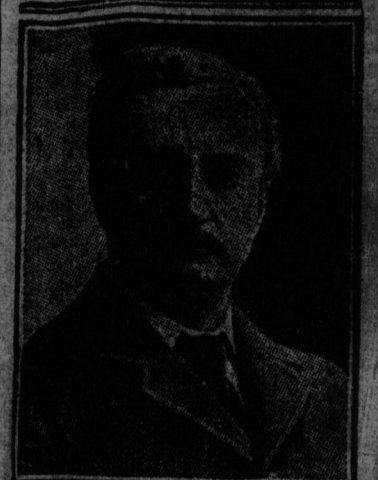
The Irish leader is suffering from a spinal shock. His condition causes no anxiety and he is progressing favorably. No visitors are received.

Mr. Redmond, at the time of the accident, was driving J. J. Cahill, M. P., to the railway station here from his residence in Aughrassa, county Wexford, when the both of the wagoners, in which they were riding, slipped, the wagon broke in two and both occupants were pitched out, into the roadway. Mr. Cahill was not injured.

Several other persons were riding in the wagon and were also thrown out. Some of them were injured.

The accident occurred on the road between Aughrassa and the railway station.

It is expected that Mr. Redmond will be laid up for several weeks.
