The tablet was made by the Plummer Engraving Service of Saint John, and the inscription is surmounted by crossed flags, the Union Jack and the Canadian flag in color. Above the flags are the letters W. M. I. in a monogram of artistic design. The inscription is as follows:

"In' proud and loving memory of our boys who gave their lives in the Great War; William Henry Henderson, Harold Linton, Thomas H. Rowley, Walter Hookway Allan. Faithful unto death. This tablet was erected by the Wiggins Male Orphan Institute." GIVES ADDRESS.

Canadian Shipping Service To Mexico Is Suggested By A. M. BELDING. HAMILTON—(By Mail)—Today's canvass of importing and exporting houses showed that those interviewed either used Canadian ports, or used

American only when there was no adequate Canadian service, or none at all. For example, William Meakins of Meakins & Sons, Ltd., said they were compelled to use an American port for exports to Mexico and South America, and certain imports from India have to come via New York. "I wish we had a service to Mexico," said Mr. Meakins. "It is a great country. I have been there and am going again." He added that the policy of his house was to use

W. E. McDOUGALL, of J. R. Moodie & Sons, is a member of the Export Club of Toronto. "You don't need to tell me about traffic through United States ports," said Mr. McDougall. "We of the Export Club have been trying to find out why it is so large." Moodie & Sons use only Canadian ports. W. Diack, speaking for Zimmerknit Ltd., said they were compelled to use nerican ports on some occasions because there was no Canadian service, but

their policy was to do every possible bit of business through our own ports.
