

## WOMAN URGES WAR TRAINING FOR INDIA

**British United Press.**  
LONDON, Jan. 11.—A complete course of military training as a part of national education and creation of a national militia by "voluntary conscription" were advocated for India by Mrs. Sarojina Naidu, first woman president of the Indian National Congress at its recent sitting in Cawnpore.

Mrs. Naidu, originally a Pacificist, declared that the Indians ought to be able to "answer a world challenge to their manhood" and held that military education would provide this ability. The militant president is a poet and was already writing creditable verse in her teens.

Long been carried out of her class and has been, with variations, a follower of Gandhi.

## IMPERIAL PARLEY IN AUTUMN IS PLANNED

**LONDON, Jan. 11.**—An Imperial conference will be held next autumn according to the present plans of the British government. None of the Dominions have yet intimated whether they will be able to attend this year and if so, what month would be most convenient to them. Unless this information received soon in London the date of the conference may be set over until 1927.

The political situation in Canada is probably the controlling factor in fixing the date, for the other dominions are now settled politically, and they could send over ministers to the conference at a few months notice.

## GALWAY ST. JOHN'S AIR SERVICE TALKED

DUBLIN, Jan. 11.—The Irish papers are talking of a possible trans-Atlantic air service between Galway, Ireland, and St. John's, Nfld., a distance of 1,700 miles.

The whole question of aviation in the Free State and its development is a civil basis to be discussed at a conference this month.

## SAYS MARRIAGE VITAL SUBJECT

**Rev. A. L. Tedford** Begins Series on Modern Weddings

**Asserts Many Unions These Times Are Little Less Than Lottery**

Before a large congregation in the Tabernacle Baptist church last night Rev. A. L. Tedford delivered the first of a series of sermons on Modern Marriage and his address was followed with close attention and appreciation. Mr. Tedford said that he was taking up the subject because he felt that marriage was the most vital thing in life today and all human happiness depended upon marriage as the basic unit in home and community life.

Unhappily settled homes, he said, meant an unhappy nation and the state of the home depended on the kind of marriage contracted. Marriage had been said to be a lottery, but Mr. Tedford stated, that it need not be, but he felt that it must be admitted that a great many of the modern marriages were more of a lottery than anything else.

## TRAGEDY REMAINS.

He said that if a man or a woman chose a companion for life from the crowd, much as one would go to a grab table and then drew a boob or a lemon, that man or woman had met no better fate than they had deserved, but the tragedy remained nevertheless. Mr. Tedford thought it was strange how many people seemed to consider the marriage lot was somehow mystical and transforming and that if the one chosen had very undesirable faults these faults would disappear afterwards.

## MADE IN OTHER PLACE.

It had been said that marriages were made in heaven, remarked Mr. Tedford, but it seemed that many modern marriages were made in the other place. If the devil could get men and women wrongly mated he knew he could stir up as much "hell" as he wanted. Many people today chose their marriage partner because of his fancy, he said. They were like Samson, who went out to the uncircumcised people and the "strange woman."

Mr. Tedford read as the scripture lesson the story of Abraham's servant going to select a wife for his master's son, Isaac. People might say they preferred to choose their own mate, Mr. Tedford pointed out, but he knew more about it than they did.

## BASIS OF UNHAPPY LIVES.

Mr. Tedford pointed out that it could not be expected that lives which had spent all their beauty, virtue and sweetness in the dance hall, at cards, in the cabaret or in taxis and other forbidden places, would be such lives as would form the basis for happy homes.

## In closing he appealed for lives to be given up to the Lord that the Lord might direct in the great choices of the soul and in the selection of a companion for life.

**Miss Grace Robertson**, secretary of the Associated Charities, with the assistance of Miss Stella Payson, has been at work compiling a tabulated list of the relief cases in the city with a view to ascertaining how great is the need for providing additional employment in the city at the present time and what measures for coordinating relief work could be adopted.

The facts ascertained in this way are to be presented at a further conference of representatives of the relief workers in the city which will probably be called some time next week. Miss Robertson hoped to have all of the lists of the city clergy and social workers by today and she has found the lists of those helped at Christmas time a great assistance. Any of the clergy, men or relief workers knowing of cases which are receiving assistance or are in need of it are asked to report the facts to Miss G. Robertson. The information is entirely confidential and will be treated as such.
