The Codfishery

AND THE BONUS

THE Labrador fishery is over for this season and all those engaged have returned to their homes. The catch has been an average one considering the number of men prosecuting the fishery on that coast. Dur ing the season ice interfered with op erations, and bad weather was prevalent for some time.

Before the season opened fishermen who prosecute the Labrador fish ery were very much concerned as to whether they should put in their time at that occupation with the chances of a small catch and low prices or seek some other form of labor. Hundreds decided to take the latter course and remain away from the fishery, but thousands of others went as in former years and took a chance. They are home now and most of them are paid for their sum mer's catch. The amount received has been rather disappointing and discouraging considering the cost of the outfit and the cost of the necessaries of life.
