COLONY OF CONVICTS. How Egypt Proposes to Deal With the

Habitual Criminal

Crime has increased to such an alarm-ing extent of late, and the ordinary measures for its repression at present in force are so madequate, that the in force are so madequate, that the Egyptian government has decided to enact a deportation law empowering it to deport to certain isolated parts of the country all old offenders, those who have evil reputations, and who, notwithstanding, their misdeeds, have managed to get round the law, says the Cairo correspondent of the Pall Mail Cairo correspondent of the Pall Mall Gazette. The power of sentencing to deportation will rest in the hands of a committee in each province, consist-ing of the governor, a judge, a memner of the Parquet, and two notables. The government has its eyes on the Dases of Kharga and Dakhela, and pro

jects establishing there penitentiary colonies, where the exiles would carry out useful work in the irrigation and development of those tracts of land. The Oases are ideal spots for the es-tablishment of such colonies, as they are absolutely isolated in the midst of the desert, the only means of com-munication with the outside world being by the Farshut railway, which the government is about to acquire. No escape is possible, as the desert is every-where watched most carefully by the camel patrols of the coastguards. The ministers of finance and of the interior have just left for these Oases in order to take definite measure before the new

law is definitely drawn up. This new scheme is really the only solution to the present serious state of affairs. How serious is that state can be best gauged when I mention that of the persons sentenced to penal ser-vitude for repeated crime and released since 1904, over 54 per cent, have been reported by the police to be living by dishonest means. By eliminating the "old offender" and "bad character" classes, their evil influence will no inger be felt, and the banishment the arid desert, miles away from the eyes of the world, will without a doubt act as a strong deterrent. The average native dreads a journey into unknown parts; in fact, it takes him a long time very often to decide to go any distance from his village; the idea of being exil-ed to the desert will, therefore, do more to keep him to the paths of righteousless than any amount of detention in
