Conn. Betts presented the petition of Thos. Clancy of Derby, for a refund of taxes collected from him in Nelson. Referred.

Conn. Kerr said two important committees, appointed last January, had not reported. One of these consisted of Conn. Betts, who had been sent to the meeting of the Good Roads Association at Fredericton.

As the servant of this Council it was his duty to report the proceedings of that very important meeting and thereby diffuse the information he had gained there. Its other committee consisted of Conn. Morrison, with the warden as alternate, and they were to go to Ottawa to strengthen the hands of the Minister of Railways in the matter of purchasing the Canada Eastern Railway.

Conn. Morrison had pleaded earnestly for the appointment of that committee. The Council would have the right to feel satisfied if no report were made.

Conn. Betts said he had been prepared to report to the July session, but no report had been made. It was a highly representative meeting, consisting of leading men from all over the province, and all its proceedings were carried on most systematically.

One of the resolutions that passed was in favor of such a change in the highway act as would enable the laborer and farmer to pay the road tax in cash. He had submitted the resolution and hoped to see it approved by the Legislature, which would consider and pass upon all the recommendations of the Good Roads Association.

Probably many of them would be adopted. Another resolution asked the Government to change the law regarding wide tires for draught vehicles so as to require the width of the tire to correspond with the width of the axle.

It was clear that it would be difficult to determine the weight of load on wagons at sight. It was the opinion of the meeting that the best way to make good roads was to use roadmaking machines and rollers. The representatives of counties presenting four or five such machines were unanimously in favor of them, and he believed it to be the duty of our representatives to get as many machines as possible for use in this county and have them placed in charge of competent men. He had left orders with the Secretary to send a copy of the proceedings to every road commissioner in the county. He had not presented a bill for his services, as the Government had paid railway fare one way and allowed the representative \$150 a day.

Conn. Pond—Did this Council authorize the representative to ask for the cash road tax system?

Warden—No, the resolution in favor of the change did not pass.
