DR. JOSEPH McLEOD CHOSEN PRESIDENT OF THE CONVENTION

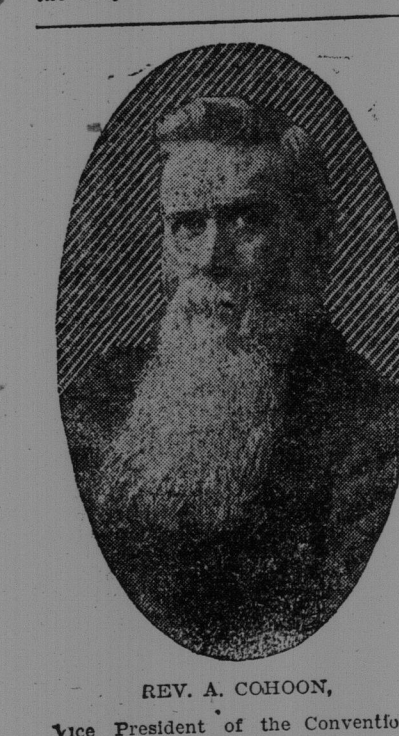
United Baptists in Session at Liverpool Talk of Establishing a Theological School at Acadia—Home Mission Report is Gratifying.

LIVERPOOL, N. S., Aug. 25.—The first annual convention of the United Baptist Churches of the Maritime Provinces opened at Liverpool, Saturday at 10 o'clock. The president, Rev. Geo. R. White, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., was in the chair. Rev. D. Hutchinson of the Main Street Baptist Church, St. John, conducted the devotional exercises. A nominating committee, of which Dr. B. H. Eaton of Halifax is chairman, was appointed.

LOST EIGHTY DOLLARS;

WENT OUT OF HIS HEAD

Eighteen Year Old Boy Losing Through a Bank Failure, Goes Insane.

CHICAGO, Aug. 26.—Johann Kinder, eighteen-years-old, today became violent and alarmed passengers in an Ashland Avenue car while brooding over the loss of \$80, which he had deposited in the failed Milwaukee Avenue State Bank. Kinder is held pending an investigation of his sanity.

Kinder is the second person to become mentally deranged as a result of the failure of this bank. In addition, three persons, including a teller of the defunct bank, have committed suicide and one man fell dead following the flight of President Paul O. Stensland and the closing of the Milwaukee Avenue State Bank.

The police tonight are still in the dark as to the whereabouts of Stensland.

Dominique Y. Breaux, a St. Joseph's College student, was drowned in the creek near the college on Saturday afternoon. He, in company with another lad, Alfred LeBlanc, went for a swim. The tide was high and there was about ten feet of water in the creek. Young Breaux seemed to slip on the muddy bank and went into the middle of the stream, sinking immediately. LeBlanc, his companion, secured a pole and endeavored to reach the drowning boy, but in vain. Breaux was a fairly good swimmer and it is thought that he must have taken a cramp as soon as he struck the water. He was seventeen years old and a bright and promising student. Two sisters and one brother, Kenneth Breaux, of Chatham, survive.
