DON'T GET EXCITED IS HAYASHI'S ADVICE

Tells Japanese Legislators to Act With Caution

In Dealing with the United States—California Passes More Bills—New Loan Not Well Received

TOKIO, March 9.—Replying this afternoon to a sensational interpretation in the house of representatives in which the Japanese were reported as suffering humiliation at the hands of Americans, Minister Hayashi called attention to the distance of the clause of Article II. of the treaty with the United States. He said that this clause was inserted in order to secure a ratification of the treaty by the United States senate. Japan, he said, was at that time reviving the treaty to abrogate extra territory which was the greatest humiliation. With reference to the interpellations Minister Hayashi emphasized the necessity of approaching the negotiations with America calmly and in a peaceful spirit, as the opposite would only tend to increase the difficulty and injure friendly relations of both nations. He also pointed out the indisputable good-will of President Roosevelt and his government toward Japan.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 9.—The senate last night unanimously passed two bills bearing on the Japanese question. One bill limits the age of admittance of all children when first entering the primary schools to ten years except when the superintendent of schools, boards of education and boards of trustees, who may grant older children the privilege of entering primary grades for the first time, consent. The bill amends the present statute authorizing the establishment of separate schools for Asiatics and Indians by including the word Japan. The other bill provides for the expression of the will and sentiment of the voters of California at the next election on the question of Asiatic immigration. A place is provided in the bill where voters can vote for or against "Asiatic immigration."

LONDON, March 9.—In the opinion of the morning newspapers the Japanese conversion loan of \$115,000,000, the prospect of which was issued yesterday, is not likely to get such an enthusiastic reception as the previous issues. The Morning Post in its financial article, voices the disappointment of the market, that the new loan is merely a charge on the general revenue and is not secured by the customs, as is the case with the previous Japanese loans. This paper says: "It is generally felt that Japan will have a very heavy task in establishing its finances on a sound basis and investors would have been better satisfied to see specific revenues assigned to the service of the new loan."

BRIEF DESPATCHES.

MADRID, March 9.—King Alfonso is confined to his bed with a chill. His majesty's physicians declare that his ailment is not serious.

BOSTON, March 8.—The Machias, Me., sloop, Fillmore, which was reported to this port with lumber, which stranded on Ram's Head bar, Broad Sound, yesterday, was floated today by the tug Clara E. Dyer and Irving Ross, but later she ran ashore again and was still ashore late tonight. In floating the schooner the tug was kind in a fight with the Indians last week. It is necessary to transport ore and supplies under heavy guard.

EL PASO, Tex., March 8.—A suit asking for \$10,000,000 actual and \$30,000,000 tentative damages was commenced today in the United States circuit court by the Pennsylvania Sugar Refining Company against the American Sugar Refining Company, H. O. Havens, president, and others. The action grows out of the failure of Adolph Segal in Philadelphia.

EL PASO, Tex., March 8.—Tex. Ricard has announced that he has signed Joe Gans and "Batting" Nelson for a fight at El Paso, Nev. The date is set for July 5. A thirty thousand dollar purse will be given and the articles call for a split of 75 and 25 per cent.

EL PASO, Tex., March 8.—Advices received from Chihuahua, Mex., today say that 35 men, women and children were killed at San Andres, 29 leagues from there, yesterday, by the accidental explosion of a large quantity of dynamite.

LONDON, March 9.—The Tribune this morning confirms recent rumors that a certain sum of money for some kind of old age pension scheme, the government having decided to make a start in this direction this year. This start will be only tentative, however, as it will take one or three years to carry through the completed plan.

TO CURTIL PRIVILEGES, ETC.

(Continued from Page One.)

It felt it proper that the committee further consider the question. On account of this, Mr. McGoldrick withdrew his motion.

George McAvity arrived at the meeting at this juncture and he corroborated the Mayor's statement that he wished to retire from the business.

Ald. Baxter moved that notice regarding the lease be read until May 1st.

"The common clerk read an application from the Canada Lands Produce and Cold Storage Co., asking for a free site in Carleton for the erection of a cold storage plant. Mr. Macdon, who writes the letter, states that the building is to cost \$100,000, and should be near the water front on the West Side. The company was incorporated in 1906. If St. John will not give the site, the company will endeavor to secure a site in Halifax. George McAvity stated that the building, if erected here, would be an up-to-date one, probably six stories high.

Ald. Baxter moved that the application be referred to the board of works which body can appoint a sub-committee to look into it.

Ald. Baxter said that he had prepared several resolutions regarding the telephone bill. These resolutions referred to the privileges of the company. He thought that as other municipalities had a position in the matter, St. John should also be represented.

Mr. Baxter's resolutions were as follows:

Resolved that this council memorialize the government of the province as follows:

1.—Against permitting any increase of capital except to such an extent as may be necessary for the reasonable conduct of the business of the company so that the users of the telephone con-

nection may not be called upon to pay excessive rates for the purpose of enabling dividends to be declared upon a greater amount of capital than is actually employed in the enterprises of the company.

2. In favor of the assumption by the government of power to control all telephone rates and tolls within the province.

3. In favor of so defining the powers of the company that special privileges now enjoyed by companies which may be absorbed by the N. B. Telephone Co., shall not be extended to any other portion of the lines of such company.

4. In favor of so amending the present charter of the N. B. Telephone Co. as to provide that the consent of such municipality within which the company may operate shall be required to do construction either above ground or under ground and that such municipality may impose a rental or charge for the use of the public streets for such purposes.

5. In favor of requiring all telephone companies to submit annually to the government an abstract of their accounts under oath and to submit their books and records to the inspection of an auditor to be appointed by the government.

Moved by Ald. Baxter and seconded by Ald. Royan, the resolution was carried. It will take the form of a petition to the government containing the views of the St. John council.

Mayor Sears was appointed to the bills and bye-laws committee who will go to Fredericton on Monday to oppose the telephone bill.

A communication was read which reviewed the business done at the recent board of trade meeting when the ward system was favored.

Mayor Sears announced that he thought the board was going out of its province when it meddled in this matter. As the letter was a courteous one those present did not favor that it be filed.

The meeting then adjourned.

BITTEN BY A BAT ON AN OCEAN VOYAGE

New York Professor Sues Steamship Company for Improper Treatment on the Trip Across

NEW YORK, March 8.—Label in the sum of \$20,000 was filed today in the U. S. District court against the Compagnie Generale Trans-Atlantique, the steamship La Gasconne, its officers and crew, by John Wurtis, a professor in the Yale law school, in the sum of \$15,000 for mental and physical anguish on his own part and \$25,000 each for his wife and his daughters Eleanor and Laura. The label alleges that on the trip from Havre to this port, between the 15th and 24th of last September, Professor Wurtis and his family were exposed to the rudest sort of treatment and ill food. It alleges that on information that there was no first cabin accommodation and he and his two daughters were booked in the second cabin, but within two hours after leaving port they found that they were overruled by 1,400 steerage passengers. It is alleged that one of the daughters, while in bed, was bitten by a bat.

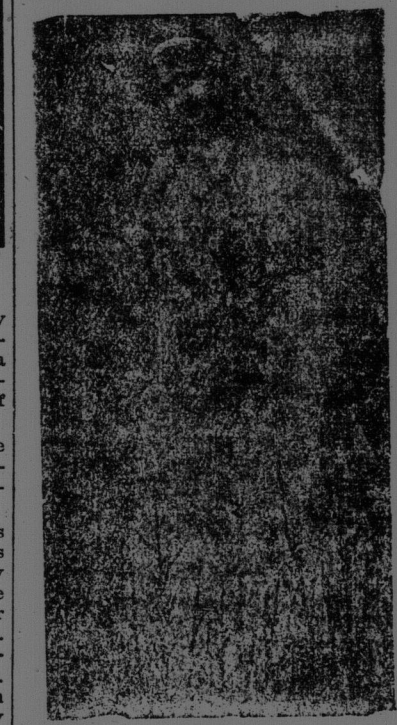
TURNED DOWN BY WOMAN, THIS MAN SUICIDED

Prominent Contractor Shot Himself When Mrs. Patterson Dropped Him.

CLEVELAND, O., March 8.—Repulsed by the woman with whom he was madly in love, Henry Debut, a prominent contractor, fired a bullet into his head while standing in the doorway of the woman's home, 1416 Prospect avenue, one of the Cleveland fashionable residence streets, this afternoon. Debut was removed to a hospital in a dying condition.

In Debut's trunk were found many letters from the object of his affections, Mrs. Florence Patterson, but it appeared that recently she had discarded him. This afternoon she answered a call to the door, but seeing Debut she closed it in his face. In an instant a shot rang out and Mrs. Patterson opened the door again to find the man lying in a pool of blood, the result of a ghastly bullet wound in the temple. Mrs. Patterson, it is said, had been separated from her husband and she is not widely known here.
