ST. JOHN ATHLETES TO COMPETE AT MONCTON

Sports Planned as Part of Big Demonstration on Labor Day

St. John athletes will probably compete in the Moncton races, in connection with the big Union Labor Fete at that place on Labor Day. The railway city is planning to conduct the most magnificent labor celebration held in the Maritime Provinces. Numerous labor organizations from all parts of the province will participate in the day's programme.

There will be a Trades and Labor Parade, in which prominent labor leaders will walk. In addition, athletic sports, horse races, base-ball, band concerts, illuminations, torch light parade and an automobile parade will be offered for the enjoyment of the onlookers. A grand display of fireworks will take place in the evening.

One very excursion rates will prevail on all railroads and Moncton expects a great demonstration.

NEW WING READY IN FIVE WEEKS

Work at Provincial Hospital is Nearing Completion

Will be Almost Fireproof—Furnishes Accommodation for Male Attendants and an Extra Dormitory.

Within the short space of four or five weeks employees and patients at the Provincial Hospital, Lancaster, will make use of the new section of institution which has been rebuilt, since the fire which occurred on January 4th last.

The laundry and boiler rooms which were also burned were immediately replaced but the need of the building was almost completed was not so urgent and was not hurried to the same extent.

In fact all carpentry work has suspended for the present and before the hard wood floors are put down and sheeting furnished Contractor Corbett, in his efforts to make an excellent job, is letting the green lumber get well seasoned.

The dimensions of this new structure is 50 by 20 feet. It is built of brick with stone foundations, casements and sashings. It is three stories high with a flat gravelled roof.

On the lower floor there will be a large dining room for the male employees, a small pantry and a fair sized storeroom. The second story will be devoted to sleeping apartments and sitting rooms for the male attendants of the hospital, and is fitted with electric light, baths, etc., and all modern improvements. Dormitories for patients will take up the third floor and large apartments, well lighted and ventilated will soon be at the disposal of the management.

At present men workers are busy putting up steel ceilings, which will be used on every floor. Every precaution is being taken to render the building fireproof.

A Star reporter was shown through the building yesterday afternoon and later in conversation with Dr. J. V. Anglin learned that the hospital authorities are well pleased with the way the building is progressing, and they hope to occupy it in about five weeks time.

NO TRACE YET OF MRS. WILLIAM BENSON

Large Party Has Been Searching All Night and is Still at Work.

With the hope that success will ultimately crown their efforts to locate Mrs. William C. Benson, over twenty-five men are conducting a vigorous search for the missing woman in the vicinity of Bellisle Creek. All night long the search was continued. Systematically every piece of ground within a wide area is being covered, but no trace of Mrs. Benson has been discovered.

A telephone message to the Star from Bellisle Creek this morning, stated that the parties intended to continue the search today. Mr. Benson has received the sympathy of the community over the disappearance of his wife and every assistance is being rendered in the search for the missing woman.
