of note in the Dominion. This furnishing of aid was one of the chief activities of the universities of this province. Others were doing the same as the U.N.B. Yet the people of the province of N.B. must be made to realize that they are not their own province. Outsiders could not be expected to do the work. No all college men were born for leadership, but a college training would give them the opportunity to develop big activities. The men and women of the province were its chief asset. Any of mental and moral manhood was needed in N.B. Such work the colleges of N.B. were developing. The old arts course, with its accumulation of the knowledge of ages told more particularly than any other course. The new sciences were developing. There was more for the future of the province than most people realized or would admit. It was well to remember this when appeals were made for assistance for the provincial university.

He felt that this province could claim a great deal of natural ability, and that there could be the older, untrained man, self-cultured, but uneducated, and was not the one who could be trusted to guide for national or provincial guidance. A man too optimistic was not a sane man. He needed the broadness of education, the breadth of university education, and the people of this province did not have the value of education. It was a shocking statement that Canada spent less for education than any civilized country. He felt that this was most true of N. B., but the province must wake to the danger. The one thing wanted by all the institutions was money.
