MANY BILLS DISCUSSED AND PASSED IN THE LEGISLATURE

Fredericton, N. B., April 13.—The
House met at three o'clock.

A number of bills were read for the
second time.

Hon. Mr. McLeod, for the Committee
on Standing Rules presented that re-
port.

A Big Saving.

Hon. Mr. Fleming in reply to Mr.
McKeown's inquiry regarding public
printing stated that new schedule of
prices was now in force. The total
cost of printing the departmental re-
ports for 1908 was \$599.98 less than
in 1907.

Claim Was Just.

Hon. Mr. Hazen replying to Mr. Low-
ell's inquiry said Stephen Schofield, a
fireman suffered injuries at the hospi-
tal fire and claimed a doctor's bill of
\$35 and \$2 per day for 5 weeks. Dr.
Anglin on investigation found the
claim just and it would be dealt with
at the next meeting of the Hospital
Commissioners.

Hon. Mr. McLeod presented a peti-
tion against the bill to incorporate the
Tobique Pulp and Paper Company, and
introduced a bill relating to immigrant
children. The latter was introduced
at the request of the Middlemore Home
making that institution guardian of all
children placed in the province.

To Aid Blind Children.

Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to
provide for additional assistance for
the support of pupils at the Halifax
School for the Blind and the Deaf and

Dumb School. Also respecting hard
labor in the County Jail and to provide
for a secret ballot and the principle
of one man, one vote at Municipal
elections.

St. John Bills.

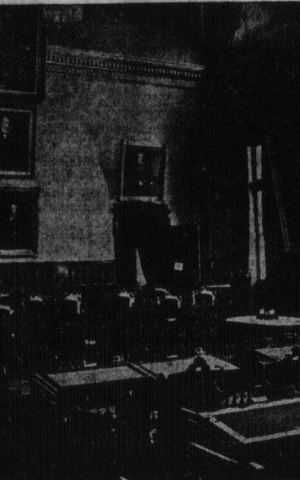
Mr. Hatheway introduced bills to au-
thorize St. John to transfer its harbor
properties to a commission; relating to
the city elections in St. John and a
petition for a bill to amend the city
Charter of St. John.

Hon. Mr. McLeod on the ground of
urgency and by unanimous consent,
moved the second reading of the bill
relating to immigrant children.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill
to amend the act incorporating the
Canadian Terminal Railway, and pre-
sented a petition of St. Stephen par-
ties to incorporate the National Power
Co. Ltd. He also introduced bills to
amend the act governing the St. Ste-
phen water supply and to amend the
act incorporating the town of St. Ste-
phen.

Central Railway Expenditures.
Mr. Byrne for Mr. McKeown gave
notice of inquiry into expenditures up-
on the Central Railway, as outlined
in the report of the Central Railway
Commission.

Hon. Mr. Hazen moved that rule
156 be added to rules of the House
providing that proof of publication of
advertisement of bills be by affidavit.
Time for introduction of private
bills was extended for three days.

LIFE IN LABRADOR MEANS ONLY FAITH, SAYS GRENFELL

(Mail and Empire)

Hundreds of thousands of people
have read and heard of the great work
which is being carried on in Labra-
dor by Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, and
after having heard him at Convec-
tion Hall yesterday morning, three
thousand of those people realized why
Dr. Grenfell has been so successful in
his work among the fishermen of the
Far North. The earnestness of the
man is so intense that it is obviously
difficult for him to say exactly what he
wants to say. But what he does say
is so convincing and makes such a
lasting impression that his words are
not soon forgotten. His sermon yester-
day was on "Life," and in the
course of it he stated why he was
working and spending his life to help
the poor fishermen of Labrador. As
he told of his miraculous escape from
death just a year ago, many of his
hearers were moved to tears. Dr.
Grenfell went through three days of
the most trying experience which man
ever was called upon to bear. While
attempting to reach the home of a
poor fisherman, in the hope of saving
his life, Dr. Grenfell was stranded on
a small piece of ice with his dogs. Af-
ter killing his dogs and skinning
them in order to use their hides to
protect his back and shoulders from
the cold, he tied the frozen limbs of
the dead dogs together and on the end
of the improvised flagpole he tied a flag,
which was seen by his rescuers. Those
who have heard the story of Dr. Gren-
fell's experience from other lips were
struck by the modesty he showed in
telling the story. He himself thought
the end had come, but he was spared
to continue the great work which he
is carrying on.

Life Over Death.

Easter Sunday, he said, reminded
very strongly of life, for on that
day people met to celebrate the vic-
tory of life over death. Christ was
the life, he said, and those who lived
without Him were dead while they
lived. It was because of that thought
he lived among the poor fishermen of
Labrador. He was a doctor of medi-
cine, and he believed that the best
thing anyone could do was to give his
fellow-men that which did not perish
when the body perished. Faith was
the great necessity. It was faith that
had made him spend his life in Labra-
dor. He had been asked often why
he lived in Labrador, but everyone
must be content to know that there
were some things which no one could
take away from him. He had seen things
in Labrador, and when he first went
there he had very feeble faith, but
he had won out, and now he had the
knowledge, for he had seen things ac-
complished. If a man wanted to suc-
ceed he would have to act on faith.

Life Is Worth While.

Life, said Dr. Grenfell, was the one
thing worth while. The reason why
men did not give up their lives to
Christ was the same reason that a
man with cancer would not go to the
hospital. He wouldn't go. He did not
want to go. He was afraid of the con-
sequences.

Dr. Grenfell then related the terri-
ble experience through which he went
just a year ago, which (he did not
state this himself) turned his hair
from jet black to its present grey col-
or in the three days he was slowly
starving and freezing until he was near
to death. When he was rescued by
the poor fishermen, each of the five
men stood on the cake of ice on which
he had floated and as each in turn
grasped his hand, tears came to the
men's eyes through sheer joy in saving
a man's life. "That is just the joy
of life," he concluded. "May God give
us that vision of what Jesus Christ
means when He says we shall share
in the joy of the successful life, the
joy which will not fade away. May
God give it to every one of us."

Dr. Grenfell will lecture on Labra-
dor on Thursday evening, and will il-
lustrate how he and his assistants en-
deavor to live as Christ would live
among the poor fishermen.
