Sixty-five Doctors in New York Hospital Suffer from Poison—Firemen Killed by Falling Wall

New York, N. Y., April 18.—The list of patients at Bellevue hospital today includes 65 physicians, the entire staff of internes at the institution. One after another the doctors became painfully ill last night after indulging in a chicken salad luncheon.

Firemen Killed.

Philadelphia, Pa., April 18.—Three firemen were killed and a dozen others seriously, some probably fatally, injured last night. They were buried beneath a wall at a fire which destroyed the five story candy factory of W. T. Scott. The dead men were Walter Costello, Henry King and Charles Moritz. The damage to the factory will be \$100,000.

VINCENT ASTOR INHERITS \$65,603,546 OF HIS FATHER'S \$87,000,000 ESTATE

With the completion of the appraisal of the estate of Colonel John Jacob Astor, who perished a year ago in the sinking of the Titanic, it was learned that the official figures place its value at \$87,216,601.05, and that Vincent Astor's share under his father's will is \$65,603,546.

According to this report, the two trust funds assigned to Mrs. Madeleine Force Astor, second wife of Colonel Astor, in the ante-nuptial agreement, are appraised at \$1,994,415 and \$311,306. The value of the ante-nuptial settlement made upon Mrs. Astor is placed at \$1,787,307.

Colonel Astor owned outright at the time of his death, according to the appraisers, property valued at \$51,258,388.

Under the inheritance tax law the estate must pay \$3,150,000. Besides this \$250,000 more must be paid to satisfy the new income tax law.

STREET RAILWAY WINS APPEAL IN RYDER CASE

Supreme Court Gives Decisions in a Number of Other Cases—Town of Grand Falls Loses Case.

Fredericton, April 18.—A number of judgments were delivered by the Supreme Court this morning. The justices in attendance being Judges Landry, McLeod, White, Barry and McKinnon. Decisions were given in the following cases:

Crown paper. In the King vs. Forbes ex parte O. D. Hanson, Judge Landry read the judgment of the court. This was a review from an order of Judge Forbes who sustained the finding of the Fairville magistrate in an action against O. D. Hanson. The latter appealed from the order and in the course of the hearing the court of appeal annulled the order.

A number of Canada Temperance Act cases, six in all, followed, being for sending liquor into Canada. Scott Act cases. These were under the title the King vs. A. D. Holvok, police magistrate of Woodstock, ex parte Wm. McIntyre. An order for review of the convictions had been obtained, and against it W. P. Jones, K. C., showed cause. Judge Barry read the court's judgment, refusing to disturb the findings, and the convictions were affirmed in each case.

In the King vs. the Town of Grand Falls ex parte Grand Falls Company, Ltd., an appeal from the assessment on the latter company's property in which F. R. Taylor supported the appeal. Justice White read the judgment of the court, sustaining the appeal. The company, which has for its president, Sir William Van Horne, and is about to establish industries there to the value of several million dollars, was assessed upon its leases on what counsel claimed was two months in advance of acquiring the property from the previous power company. Claim was also made that being leased from the Crown the property was not assessable. P. J. Hughes for the towns, claimed certiorari would not lie. The court ruled that the town under the circumstances had no jurisdiction to assess and allowed certiorari, but without costs in favor of either party.

In the King vs. Matheson, Police Magistrate of Campbellton ex parte Amosie Gilmond, a Scott Act conviction argued on behalf of the Scott Act party by the late Wm. Murray, the rule for a certiorari was discharged. Justice White dissented.

This completed the judgments, and the court adjourned sine die.

AGED MAN IS SENT UP FOR TRIAL. Fredericton, April 18.—In the police court this morning Colonel Marshall gave his decision in the case of Joel S. Scott, charged with assault on a girl under fourteen years of age. He decided to send the prisoner up for trial in June.

WILL SETTLE ROUTE OF VALLEY RAILWAY

Provincial Government to Deal with Question at Next Meeting—Three Prisoners in Court.

The superintendent and secretary were reappointed. The question of allowing automobiles in the cemetery was brought up, and will be dealt with at the next meeting.

The announcement of the improvement in the financial situation in London, which was marked yesterday by a reduction of the Bank of England rate from 5 to 4½ per cent, is expected to be followed by an improvement in the local situation.

ST. JOHN MAN SELLS BIG LUMBER TRACT

Fredericton, April 18.—The Kewick Lumber Company, of which W. P. Lowell, of Bangor, Me., is the head, completed a deal for the purchase of a large tract of lumber lands in York county. The limits included in the transfer are largely in the parish of Douglas, and are those of which Moses Haines has been carrying on operations in connection with his mill at the mouth of the Nashwaakias stream. About 1,200 acres are involved, and the price paid is in the vicinity of \$3,000. Alex. Watson, of St. John, was the recent owner. John R. McConnell, Marysville, is interested in the business, and the transfer was put through by Fred. H. Peters, of this city.

MIRAMICHI RIVER NOW CLEAR OF ICE.

Chatham, April 18.—The ice started to run yesterday as predicted by the "old salts" who are wise to the ways of the river ice. The river is now open to navigation and among the earliest tugs to go up stream and start in at work was the St. Andrew of the Snowball fleet. It is expected that the ferry steamer will be ready for service about Tuesday or Wednesday, the only thing needed is enough water to take it off the slip at Perry road, and it is expected the tides will be high enough for this on Tuesday.
