

## KEEPING WATCHFUL EYE ON REV. MANNIX

Delivered Exceedingly Mischievous Speeches in New York Which Attracted Britain's Ear.

London, July 22.—David Lloyd George, the Prime Minister, today told the House of Commons that the Government was fully aware that Archbishop Mannix, of Australia had been delivering exceedingly mischievous speeches.

The Premier's announcement came in reply to a question by Sir Frederick W. Young, coalition Unionist for the Swindon division of Wiltshire and formerly a member of the South Australian parliament.

Sir Frederick again had asked what the Government proposed to do regarding Archbishop Mannix's visit to Ireland. Mr. Lloyd George said the matter was being considered.

## France Shaping For Olympic Games

Elimination Contests Begin in the Regis Vincennes to Select a Team.

Paris, July 22.—France began today the great elimination contests for her delegation of athletes who will compete in the Olympic games at Antwerp.

Picturesque scenes inaugurated a two-day athletic carnival in the region of Vincennes, where the gift of the Pershing Stadium to the French by the American army was officially commemorated by the unveiling of a tablet by Major General Henry F. Allen, commanding the forces at Coblenz.

In addition to the alien honor of winning the contest for the Olympic games, there is a purse of 15,000 francs in prizes given by the sporting committee of the Paris city council. French school children, who are now compelled to take physical instruction, gave an exhibition, and classic dances were performed by troupes of forty-eight young women.

## COUNCIL DECIDES AGAINST RUSSELL

Winnipeg Defense Committee Not Pleased With Decision Handed Down.

Winnipeg, July 21.—The decision of the Privy Council in the Russell case will be accepted as disposing of contemplated appeals on behalf of the other convicted Winnipeg labor leaders. It was intimated this afternoon by James Law, Secretary of the Defense Committee.

Mr. Law said he had no word yet from Mr. Trueman or his London agents but accepting the press reports of the case as accurate, he intimated that there would seem to be no advantage in entering further appeals, which would of necessity have to be argued along the lines similar to the Russell appeal.

"The decision emphasizes the difference between human and property rights," said F. J. Dixon, M. L. A., leader of the Manitoba Labor Parliamentary group, in discussing the judgment in the Russell case. "According to the decision of the Privy Council," he added, "civil cases dealing with property rights can be appealed, but criminal cases dealing with human rights cannot. There should be the right of appeal in both cases or none at all."

## COMMERCIAL MISSION TO VISIT WASHINGTON

Paris, July 20.—The Russian Soviet government has requested Washington to receive and recognize an official "Commercial Mission" which the bolsheviks desire to send to America, according to a reliable report circulating in Russian circles here this afternoon. The mission, it is planned, will open offices in New York and endeavor to come to terms with American banks and firms for the resumption of Russian-American trade.

Envoy Krassin, who conducted the recent Soviet negotiations in London, will head the delegation, it is reported, which hopes to visit America in September. The present Soviet bureau in New York, headed by Sauter Nuorteva, will be abandoned owing to its "consistent tactlessness," it is stated.

## MEXICAN BOAT TURNS TURTLE

San Diego, Cal., July 22.—The Mexican power schooner Jauris Onda, formerly the Japanese-owned Toni Maru, turned turtle and foundered recently at night off Mazatlan, Mexico, with the loss of forty-two lives, according to word brought here today by the motorship Jeannette R.

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## THE Athletes Secured In Olympic Trials

Twenty-Five of Canada's Best Will Sail from Montreal Tomorrow on The Way to Belgium to Compete for World's Championship.

Toronto, July 22.—(By the Canadian Press)—Twenty-five of Canada's best athletes secured in the Olympic trials at various parts of Canada, will sail from Montreal on the steamship Melton on Saturday next, on their way to Belgium to compete for the world's championships in their various fields of sport and athletics. This will be the third section of Canada's Olympic contestants to leave Canada's shores for the big Olympiads the first section was composed of the Falcon hockey team of Winnipeg which returned home "with the bacon."

The second was composed of tracksters. The section to sail on Saturday known as the main body of Canada's Olympic candidates and will be in charge of James G. Merrick, Toronto, as manager, Chairman of the Canadian Olympic Committee and Norton L. Orr, Toronto, Secretary of the Committee. Walter R. Knox of Orillia will go along as coach, and C. A. Beebe of Toronto, as trainer for the cyclists. C. Freeman, Toronto, 3,500 metres and walks; Cecil Coffey, Winnipeg, 100 and 200 metres.
