Claims He Obeyed Commander in Torpedoing Hospital Sun.

Leipsec, July 13.—The German submarine lieutenants, Ludwig Dittmar and Joham Boldt, were placed on trial here yesterday in the supreme court charged with murder in the first degree for firing on life boats after the torpodoing of the Canadian hospital ship, Llandovery Castle, in the summer of 1918.

The case differs from the others which have been heard by the court in connection with charges growing out of violations of civilized warfare, inasmuch as the proceedings are on behalf of the German public prosecutor. Great Britain had only demanded the trial of Commander Pating, of the submarine which torpeded the hospital ship, who fled the country, but the prosecutor, after examining the evidence, ordered the trial of Dittman and Boldt.
