London, July 29.—Baseball fans were treated to the best game of the season on Saturday afternoon at Tecumseh Park, when the Western Ontario Regiment team defeated Del Oreut's Brantford semi-pros by the score of 3 to 0.

"Lefty" Dumond, who has developed into one of the most elusive portenders turned loose in these parts, so completely baffled the visiting team that it seemed impossible for them to squeeze a runner around the paths. The game was fast throughout and had all the earmarks of a pitchers' battle until the soldiers managed to find Harvey Muir's range. Once this was secured the khaki lads soon scored a run and poor coaching at third base, when the runners took much liberty with McKeely's arm, robbed them of at least two more rallies. Three more hits in the sixth frame gave the locals another run, although two could have been scored with better judgment. Try errors by Plint presented the soldiers with their third tally in the seventh.

EXAM RESULTSCandidates Who Are Enti-  
tled to Enter Faculties  
of Education

The candidates named above passed the parts of the Upper School examination for entrance to the faculties of education at the University of Toronto and Queen's University, Kingston. The part of the examination passed is indicated after each name.

The answer papers of each candidate whose marks would appear to justify an appeal have been already re-read by the appeal examiners. Where such a candidate has still failed, the statement of marks will be sent to the appeal examiners, and appeal will be allowed. In all other cases of failure appeals will not be refused if received by Sept. 1, and accompanied by a fee of \$2.00. If made after Sept. 1, the fee is \$5.00. No appeal received after Sept. 10 will be entertained.

Certificates and statements of the marks obtained by successful candidates are in course of preparation and will be mailed in due time to the principals, to whom all candidates are referred for further information.

In addition to those listed above, many candidates are qualifying for certification under the farm employment regulations. All such passed local examinations at Easter, and are now employed on farms. On the submission to the Deputy Minister of Education of satisfactory evidence of three months continuous employment on farms, the certificates to which they are entitled will be issued.

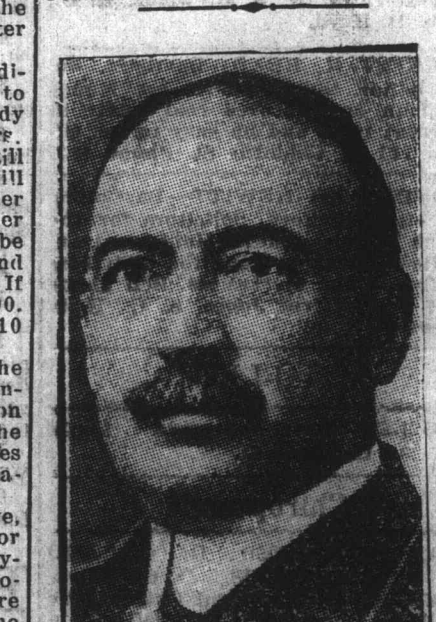
