Funtastic tables

An unusual table can easily be created with a bit of imagination and the colorful impact of paint. This can be a project as large as your dining room table. or a coffee table or end table that needs a bright, new look.

First of all, paint it. Enamel will quickly and easily add dazzle to a table of any kind. Color choice in enamel is wide. Colors range from bold and sassy shades to the palest pastals.

Now paint it properly so the finish is smooth and glossy. Here's how, according to the National Paint, Varnish and Lacquer Association (US).

"The proper application of enamel is important to achieving a smooth finish. Load the brush generously. Flow the enamel onto the surface in long, smooth strokes with the grain of the wood. Don't reload the brush. Cross-stroke. Then with the nearly dry brush, go over the surface with the grain, once again using long, smooth strokes.

You will get even coverage and eliminate any ex-

cess which might cause drips of enamel to form Now a design idea to transform that table into a conversation piece. It begins with a piece of clear glass, cut to fit your table and with edges smoothed. Under the glass, arrange green ferns from the flor-ist, pressed wild flowers, dried butterflies from a hobby centre. Or try colorful construction paper or tissuepaper cut-outs arranged in a contemporary design. You may wish to work out a Christmas de-

sign, or one of family mementos or travel souvenirs. Design ideas are limited only by your imagination and, best of all, you can re-arrange your collection

to fit the seasons, your mood or the occasion.
